

Encouraging Report In Employment Conditions

The Charlottetown National Employment office reports that it has a far smaller number of people seeking employment than was the case a year ago. The reduction amounts to at least 40 per cent. It has been a real good year for an employment standpoint, and opportunities for work have occurred more frequently than in the past half-dozen years. Furthermore, state the officials, it seems quite likely that if the weather holds favourable, large number of men will be employed well into the autumn months.

It is expected that the new naval building, which is to be erected on Paoli's old wharf property, will be started in the autumn and Charlottetown's new theatre will also be under construction in the very near future. Notwithstanding the fact that the new Federal Building is about completed, and that a smaller number

of men are employed there than for some time, there has been no effect on the general employment situation. The men released from the Federal Building in the past several months, have been absorbed into other work, and there is in fact a good demand for skilled workers at the present time. Fifty tradesmen have been recruited to work at Goose Bay and other northern sites during the past two weeks. Those taken for the most part were carpenters with a small proportion of plumbers and other skilled workers.

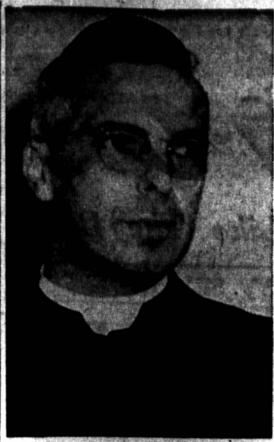

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Laymen's Conference Convened At Stanhope

More than 100 men of the United Church last night began a three-day conference at Stanhope for the purpose of deepening their spiritual lives and to discuss mutual problems that concern the laity and the church. Mr. Allison MacKinnon of Charlottetown is conference chairman. At the outset he welcomed the delegates and called attention to the theme of the meeting which is, "Going His Way".

Mr. Russell Ewing of Charlottetown opened the conference with devotions. Mr. K. A. Parker gave a short talk on the function of the laity in the Christian Training Centre and urged those present to support the centre by contributing to its fund and by securing candidates for the courses given.

Eight discussion groups are considering such subjects as Personal Commitment, Church Extension, Missions at Large and Open to the World. Mr. Ewing is often said that people tend to think in terms of headlines. Life is so complicated and the canvas of humanity so large that most of us can only grasp the news in capsule form.

Douglas Wilson said in addressing the conference on the theme "Heresies in the Headlines". The media of communication such as newspapers, magazines and radio are compelled, by the flood of words, to condense news into brief blocks. Dr. Wilson, the fact is often overlooked that it is the bizarre, the abnormal, the sordid that reach the headline page. "The good, the beautiful and the true, rarely gets the lead page. But day in and day

Out, the ordinary citizen is meeting the emergencies of life with courage, love and integrity.

This principle of "short-hand" thinking leads to certain ideas capturing the views of the multitude. Some of the notions thus prevalent in recent generations, listed by the speaker, were: the idea of inevitable progress, the rise of a "brave new world"; the primary importance of logic and reason in the affairs of man; and the belief that humanism could cope with the difficulties of existence. The two great wars and one depression destroyed the first idea; the necessity of co-operative love and affection had moderated the tyranny of sheer logic; and the impotence of human effort to solve our most grievous problems had cast doubt on the last.

In place of these "headline heresies" Dr. Wilson drew attention to the claims of the Gospel. Biblical teaching always put the responsibility for growth on the individual person. 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Musky Expert Sees Highlands

LONDON (CP) — A Canadian professor who specializes in the study of musky is touring Orkney and the highlands of Scotland by car and trailer, studying peat formations and land reclamation.

N. W. Radforth, professor of biology at McMaster University, Hamilton, Ont., ended his visit at Minard in Argyleshire studying an area of deep peat bog which is going under trees.

Prof. Radforth has spent much of his life studying the musky areas of Northern Canada and has recently classified the formations into 30 distinct groups. His visit is tied in with a Scottish invention of a lightweight crawler tractor which may facilitate transport in the difficult musky country. James Cuthbertson of Biggar, who developed the tractor, has visited Canada to arrange the first trials of the machinery.

The tractor has a track arrangement with an exceptionally low load per square inch of track area. One machine and ancillary equipment are already in Canada.

Police said they rounded up a number of suspects in their search for nationalist terrorists. Military headquarters reported at least 30 rebels dead in various incidents throughout the country.
