ALBERTON FIRE BRIGADE MEETS
A meeting of the Alberton Fire Brigade was held in the Legion Hall last evening at 8 o'clock with a good attendance. Fire Chief John C. Matthews presided. Minutes of the last meeting, on Nov. 20th were read by the secretary, Doug Nicholson and approved.
Fire Chief Profit stated that the purpose of the meeting was to further re-organize the Fire Department and he requested that a captain and two lieutenants be appointed for the different departments, such as truck, hose, chemical, salvage, hook and ladder and pumper engine.
The following appointments were approved by the meeting: Pumper engine, Charles Frott, Jr., James Smith and Erskine Gavin; fire engine, Perley Hardy and Steve Burke; hook and ladder, William Albert and Albert Clarke; hose, Erskine Campbell and Doug Nicholson; salvage, E. W. Hardy.
It was suggested that a firemen's club be organized where the firemen could meet at least once a month to learn their respective jobs and also for recreation and several ideas were discussed.
Much discussion followed regarding the hiring of a suitable caretaker for the fire equipment whose duties would be to keep the equipment in first class condition at a stated salary per month plus an additional amount per hour while engaged on an actual fire or fire drill. Several names were suggested to be interviewed by the secretary.
The next meeting is to be held on May 13th in the Legion Hall and the Fire Chief urged all present to promote attendance at this meeting in order that vacancies in the various departments could be filled and fire practices arranged to acquaint all the new members with their duties.
