**CBC Changes To Mean No Early Change For Public**

 OTTAWA (CP) — Canadian radio listeners and television viewers may have to wait a year or so before they notice any major changes in the national broadcasting system.

The system, made up of the publicly-owned CBC networks and affiliated privately-owned stations, will remain basically the same under the new 15-member board of broadcast governors appointed Tuesday.

The BBG, headed by Dr. Andrew Stewart, who is leaving the presidency of the University of Alberta, becomes the regulatory body over all broadcasting. In this function, it takes over from the CBC board of governors which goes out of existence after 22 years.

Such a dispute might arise, for example, where the CBC opposes a private station's application for a competing radio or TV station. Previously, the CBC never publicly disclosed full reasons for such opposition, but now will be in a position to do so before the BBG.

 The BBG will deal only with regulations governing the various sides of broadcasting, and will have no authority over the CBC's finances which will come under the jurisdiction of Parliament and the government.

Authorities said Thursday the government has arranged to keep some 200 of these engineers at useful work by awarding them companies several development projects that the armed forces wanted done.

Government officials did not furnish an estimate of the amount of money involved in this scheme but an industry source said the total would come to between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000.

The arrangement is only a temporary one and will cover a period of about five months. By that time the government believes the engineers involved will be re-assigned to other engineering work in Canada.

**Gov't. Acts To Keep At Home Electronic, Missile Experts**

OTTAWA (CP) — The government is taking measures to prevent dispersion of a group of electronic and missile engineers and their exodus to the United States, it was learned Thursday.

The problem arose last month when the government scrapped two major defence projects: The Sparrow air-to-air missile and the Astra armament control system for the supersonic Arrow jet interceptor.

Many engineers had to be laid off and industry sources said last week that hundreds were seeking new employment in the U.S. American companies have sent engineer recruiting teams into Canada.

**Canada's Trade Deficit Slashed**

OTTAWA (CP) — The chronic Canadian deficit in trade has been slashed to less than one-third of what it was a year ago. But while imports fell sharply, exports also dropped a little.

The recession - scarred trade picture, as outlined in a barebones bureau of statistics summary Thursday, shows that the deficit—excess of imports over exports—dropped to \$197,800,000 in the first nine months of the year from \$659,500,000 a year previous.

Imports in that period dropped by a spectacular \$486,300,000 to \$3,814,300,000 from \$4,300,600,000 last year. Exports slipped only by a tiny \$24,600,000 to \$3,616,500,000 from \$3,641,100,000.

The proportion of Canadian trade with the United States, Canada's main customer, declined. The proportion of Canadian exports absorbed by the U.S. slipped to 58.9 per cent from 59.9 last year. The percentage of Canadian imports coming from the U.S. dropped to 69.7 from 72.

The proportion of exports going to Britain rose to 15.6 per cent from 15.1; of imports coming from Britain, to 10.2 from 9.1.

**N.S. Firm Buys Que. Apples To Fill UK Orders**

KENTVILLE, N.S. (CP) — A large co-operative in the heart of the Annapolis Valley apple belt has been forced to buy Quebec apples to meet a United Kingdom market.

A.E. Calkin, general manager of the Scotian God Co-operative said Tuesday 17,000 bushels of apples from Farnham, Que., now on their way to Britain. He said it was the first time Nova Scotia growers had been unable to meet U.K. market demands.

One of the smallest crops on record is expected here. Early season estimates of 1,400,000 bushels may have been high, Mr. Calkin said. Last year the valley produced 3,000,000 bushels.

Scotian God is negotiating with Quebec growers for more apples. Mr. Calkin said the Nova Scotia shortage was greatest in McIntosh varieties.

TORONTO (CP) — Police said Monday they are looking for a man who has masterminded a teen-aged burglary gang in Toronto's east end for more than two years. Five teen-agers were charged Friday with a 1,000 burglary and officers said it was the first break into the gang's activities.
