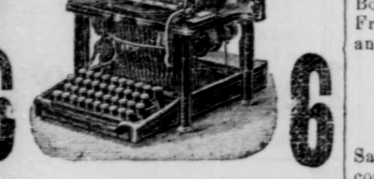

A NARROW ESCAPE. On Friday, 12th inst., two young men, viz., Michael Murphy, son of Francis Murphy, Eymvale, and John Dunan, son of David Dunan, Canoe Cove, engaged in fishing lobsters for the Portland Packing Company's factory, owned by Mr. Tidmarsh, left the factory at noon time to go out to their nets, which were about seven miles distant. About two o'clock a strong northeast gale blew up, rendering it impossible for them to return to the factory. They, nevertheless, fought bravely against the wind and current, as they were well skilled in the art of managing a boat; but all to no effect. The foremost of their boat gave way, and the water was fast coming into her. Their prospects of ever reaching land again were few. No matter what they did 'twas self-evident the boat would not long prove their friend. But 'luckily enough when almost all hope of safety was dimmed, a schooner from St. Peter's Island, but such was matter impossible on that evening. They proceeded to Pictou, and the kindness shown them by the good captain they will remember till memory fails them.

They came from Pictou to Charlottetown on the steamer St. Lawrence. They were taken free of charge and treated in the best manner possible. The steamer arrived at Charlottetown at 8 o'clock Saturday evening, and they were there met by Mr. McKinnon, foreman of the above named factory, who spared neither time nor means to ascertain the fate of the highly esteemed fishermen. He had despatches sent to all the ports along the coast, where they might drift into, and finally the word came they were picked up by a schooner, and taken to Pictou. The report that the young men were lost soon became firmly circulated, and great was the excitement of parents, friends and all who were acquainted with them. One hundred people or more were at the factory on Sunday; some to hear tidings about them, and those who had already heard of their rescue went to welcome them back. The rescued men have again resumed their labor with as much courage as if nothing had happened to them.

THE EXPERIMENTAL FARM.—It is announced from Ottawa that between January and May the Central Experimental Farm distributed 22,445, three pound packages of small grain to farmers besides 3,147 one pound samples of valuable cross bred and hybrid cereals, all originated at the farm during the past eight year.

The population of the United Kingdom in the middle of 1896 is estimated at 29,463,697 persons; that of England and Wales at 20,731,092, of Scotland at 4,185,849, and of Ireland at 4,547,756. In the United Kingdom 280,900 births and 156,913 deaths were registered in the three months ending March 31, 1896. The natural increase of population was, therefore, 104,987.

JUNE 22, 1896. REMINISCENCES OF A GRIT LIE.

It is not absolutely correct to say that the grits are opposed to manufacturers. There is one industry which they have always fostered and encouraged by precept and example,—more particularly at the time of an election; and that industry is the manufacture of bogus telegrams to the press. The Guardian editor is annoyed that so good a paper should be charged with this dishonest practice. It will not, we presume, pretend to the possession of more sanctity than its grt confere, the Mon real Witness. The Glosbs, of course, must be left out of the comparison, as its record is not savory. But we shall shortly show that the Witness, as a sinner in this respect, has scored higher marks, which will, no doubt, fill the Guardian and Patriot with envy.

The following quotation from Pope's Life of Sir John A. Macdonald, vol. II. says before an incident which for political meandacy is without a parallel in any country. Just read it, electors, and ask yourselves is there any cause for wonder that we see the grip every day filled with bogus telegrams? Here is the quotation referred to:

"Sir John spent the summer of 1873 at Riviere du Loup with his family. It was the period of the Pacific Scandal, and consequently a time of unusual political excitement. On the 5th of August, Lady Macdonald received an anonymously worded telegram of enquiry from a friend as to the state of her husband's health. A few minutes later another came, followed by more of mysterious import, all hinting at something apparently too dreadful for expression. Lady Macdonald at once took them to Sir John, who, equally with herself, was at a loss to divine their meaning. Telegraphic intelligence from Riviere du Loup, to the effect that Sir John Macdonald had attempted to commit suicide by jumping of the pier at that place. The following is the paragraph as it appeared in the Witness of the 4th of August, 1873:—

"SAD END OF THE PREMIER.—A telegram was shown to several gentlemen in the city (Montreal) this forenoon, and the doings of Sir John A. Macdonald at Riviere du Loup. It is stated that yesterday afternoon Sir John attempted to commit suicide by jumping from the wharf into the water. He was rescued, but now lies, it is asserted, in a precarious condition."

On the following morning (the 5th) the Toronto Globe published the statement in the form of a "special" from Montreal, in which city, it was good enough to add, the rumor had caused a very "painful sensation." It was "previously shown that no such telegram had ever been sent from Riviere du Loup, or received at Montreal, and that the whole affair was deliberately manufactured to feed the excitement which the publication of the McMullen correspondence, a few days before, had produced.

The Globe's report next day was substantially the same as the above. On the 6th, however, it published, under the form of a correction, an intimation that something had happened to the premier which his friends were endeavoring to hush up. This is the correction:

"The sensation concerning the premier is rapidly dying out, and the influence of repeated assurances that the rumor was without foundation.—Toronto Globe, (telegram from Montreal) Aug. 6, 1873."

The only notice Sir John took of this outrage was to despatch reassuring telegrams to his relatives and intimate friends, one of which read:

"It is an infamous falsehood, I never was better in my life."

As far as he was concerned newspaper attacks, even of a nature so vile as the one, affected him but little. Indeed he used to say they rather gratified his vanity than otherwise, reminding him, as they did, that when a boy he invariably found the best apples growing on a tree at whose foot lay the greatest number of sticks and stones.

The Witness and Globe are just as bitter and unreliable to-day as they were then. The ameliorating hand of time has wrought no improvement upon them nor is the Patriot so whit better than its sources of information.

We mention this incident to show the electors of to-morrow that no credence can be attached to the political news contained in those papers.

Dr. Jamieson and his fellow officers in Transvaal have been committed for trial in London for infringing the Foreign Enlistment Act. In a raid of this kind nothing succeeds like success, and nothing fails like failure. The Uitlander leaders paying \$100,000 fines for their liberty and the raiding leaders going to their trial as criminals makes this a very big failure.
