Mr. MacRae said that when the association proposal is received by the ministers of the Maritime provinces, it will be considered by the various governments.

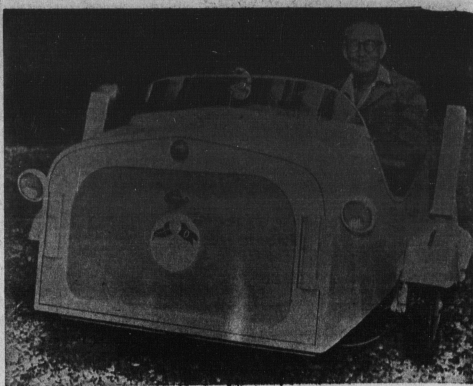
"Following this," he said, "the ministers will meet again with the association to give an answer on the proposal."

Montague RHS Has 641 Register

MONTAGUE — Although final registration figures won't be available until after school opens in another month, it appears that Montague Regional High School will have an even larger enrollment this year than last.

Health Dept. Continues Water Tests

P. A. HEALTH DEPT. 124 — Testing of the water for contamination in swimming areas has been continued by the provincial department of health, at the request of civic authorities.

The latest reports show the immediate area of the bathing house at Victoria Park to be almost consistently 'good'. Of 12 samples tested at different times and under different tide and wind conditions only two registered 'C' (a 'doubtful' class. All other samples received an A rating.

However, the same favorable results were not obtained at Kirkwood Drive West where 9 samples were taken and reported 'F'. Of these only three received an A rating as 'good'. The rest were in the 'doubtful' class. The other tests ranged in count to as high as 100 and all but one was considered as doubtful.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Archie Moore and Cassius Clay will meet in a 15-round heavyweight fight here Oct. 23.

Promoters Cal Eaton and George Parnassus have disclosed that Moore has been guaranteed \$75,000, with \$40,000 going to the unbeaten Clay.

The fight probably will be on closed-circuit television, blacked out in this area.

Moore, believed to be 41, and still recognized as lightweight champion by the California Athletic Commission, was present at the announcement par after 36 holes of the 72-hole tournament; which ends Sunday.
