Dalhousie Beats Glace Bay Team

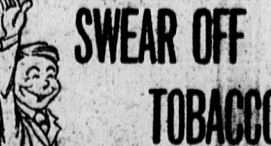
By Score of 2-1 1921 Hockey Season Was Opened in Fast Game
