

Milwaukee Loses Crucial Game In NL Pennant Race

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Bob Clemente's two-out 10th-inning single gave Pittsburgh Pirates a 2-1 victory over Milwaukee Thursday and dropped the Braves a full game behind the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers with only seven games remaining in the drama-packed National League race.

Righthander Bob Friend, the Pittsburgh pitching ace, stopped the pennant contenders with a four-hit masterpiece to bring his season record to 16-16.

Clemente's single broke a 1-1 deadlock after the Braves knotted the score in the ninth with the aid of two errors by Pirate first baseman Dale Long.

Bill Mazeroski led off the Pittsburgh 10th with his second hit of the game, moved to second on a sacrifice and tallied on Clemente's solid smash to centre.

It was Friend's first victory since Aug. 26. The loss went to reliever Ray Crone.

HOMER FOR PIRATES

Jack Shepard's seventh homer of the season—a 370-foot pole over the left field wall—put the Braves ahead in the seventh and they had the game in the bag until Long blew it with his two mistakes.

Chuck Tanner, batting for Milwaukee starter Bob Buhl, walked to lead off the ninth and moved to second on a sacrifice. Frank Torre then bounced out second for Tanner and moved to third. With two out, Hank Aaron grounded to shortstop but Long muffed Dick Groat's toss and then threw wild past third as Tanner scored.

Friend handled 14 Braves in or der before Johnny Logan collected the first base-hit on a deep drive to short. Logan also got a single

in the 10th. The only other hits off Friend were Aaron's single and Bob Thomson's double in the seventh.

SMALL CROWD

Only 1,891 fans, the smallest crowd of the season, watched the tight pitcher's duel. The temperature during the contest, the only game in the major's Thursday, was in the mid-40s.

The defeat dropped the Braves two games below Brooklyn in the all-important loss column. Milwaukee opens a three-game series with the Cubs at home tonight and the Dodgers come to Forbes Field for a four-game set with the Pirates.

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The one notable exception is Don Newcombe, the team's ace pitcher, who thinks the Dodgers may win or lose the pennant in Pittsburgh this weekend.

"I think we should be able to get a pretty good idea whether we'll win it after our four-game series in Pittsburgh," Brooklyn's Dodgers manager said before the Thursday game. "If I should return to Brooklyn next Tuesday no worse than even in the last column," he added, "we should do it."

Newcombe had in mind, of course, that the Brooklyn's final games of the season will be played at friendly Ebbets Field, two against the fifth-place Philadelphia Phillies and three against the sixth-place Pirates.

BRVES ON ROAD

On the other hand, Milwaukee's final four games of the season will be played on the road, one against third-place Cincinnati and the last three against the fourth-place St. Louis Cardinals.

Dodger manager Walter Alston has nominated Sal Maglie to open the Pittsburgh series tonight. Alston's pitching choice for Saturday lies between Carl Erskine and Roger Craig with Newcombe on tap for Sunday.

Pittsburgh manager Bobby Bragan has named his pitching choices for all four games. Ronnie Kline will open up today and he will be followed by Vern Law on Saturday, either Red Numbo or Dick Hall on Sunday and Bob Friend on Monday.

Noble Adios Wins Little Brown Jug At Delaware

DELAWARE, Ohio (AP)—Noble Adios, bay colt owned by Paul Wixom of Chicago and driven by Johnny Simpson of Orlando, Fla., Thursday won the \$52,666 Little Brown Jug pace for three-year-olds in straight heats.

Noble Adios, a full brother of the 1954 Jug winner, Adios Harry, took the first heat in 2:01 and the second in 2:00 4-5 to defeat nine other three-year-old pacers in the classic over Delaware County Fairgrounds' half-mile track.

The speedy colt took the first heat by a length over Adioscot and the second by three-quarters of a length over Adiosway.

Bachelor Hanover, the odds-on pre-race favorite, was fourth in the first heat and fifth in the second.

Noble Adios led all the way in the opening mile jaunt, then snatched the lead from Bachelor Hanover at the three-quarter pole in the second to come on to win in a great stretch drive.

Back of Noble Adios they finished this way in the two heats: Adioscot 2-3, Adiosway 9-2, Canny Scot 3-4, Bachelor Hanover 4-3, Buckeye 5-6, Newport Frisco 6-7.

Yvon Durelle Scores Kayo

MONCTON (CP)—Canadian lightweight champion Yvon Durelle, 179, of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., scored a first-round knockout over Gary Garafola, 185, Jersey City, N.Y., here Thursday night in a scheduled 10-round non-title fight.

The end came at 2:01 when Durelle put together two short left hooks to the U.S. boxer's head. Garafola sank to the canvas face first.

Garafola showed lots of pep in the first few seconds but suddenly waned and Durelle finished him with short lefts.

An estimated 2,700 fans saw the fight. Several customers milled around the ring and cries of "fake, farce" and other barbs were directed at Garafola and his manager Lou Meyer.

The victory enabled the Baie Ste. Anne fighting fisherman to keep his slate clean in the Moncton ring. It was his fourth win of the season against one loss, to Arthur Howard early this year in England.

Ernie Durelle, 150, scored a six-round decision over Don Trainor, 160, Charlottetown. Durelle showed more aggressiveness than the PEI scrapper, who was making his first ring appearance in six months.

SPORT ECHOES

Faked Wrestling Evident Detracts From Sports Event

We came away from the wrestling bouts at civic stadium with mixed feelings in the tag match. Some of the body blocks and slams seemed as good as the best you see on television. The boys demonstrated most of the common professional holds though there were none of the spectacular drop kicks in evidence.

On the other hand there were times when the "faking" was a bit too evident. Occasionally a boy fell groaning after his opponent had partially missed his target, and some of the pampering and kicks had an emphatic "phony" written all over them.

Everyone knows that wrestling has a high percentage of make-believe, but this does not detract from the sport as an entertaining spectacle. After all, we go to the shows and know that the hero is not the cool-deadly daredevil he is scripted to be, or that the villain has really expired when they pump those movie bullets into him. Yet we put all those facts into the back recesses of our brains and go along with the deception, to our personal satisfaction and enjoyment. So it is with wrestling. But the faking must look real. Slip-ups tend to spoil the pretence and therefore the show.

Then the boys carried the buffoonery a little too far, we thought. A little helps to lend spice to the contest as a little humor helps a serious talking picture or stage show. But too much of even a good thing is objectionable, and when wrestlers start "biting" each other on the forearms, the "victims" howling with pain, we start to fidget and yawn and wonder if we shouldn't have stayed at home and read the Burdock's Blood Bitters Almanac over again.

Lea Hughes and Sky Hi-Lee put on a quieter but more professional bout. When the big boy from Little Rock punched the Cowboy and Hughes made with the agony, you almost felt it was true Sky Hi-Lee could pull his punches without advertising in headlines to everyone in the stadium. Of course, you're not supposed to punch an opponent according to wrestling rules but all a good referee ever has to do is to keep protesting the rule infractions that go on without interruption in a wrestling ring. We also liked the sinister way the big Hi-Lee fellow stalked his opponent, like a big mountain lion approaching the kill. But boy, what a good barber could do to that Arkansas traveller!
