By telegraph to Peake Bros. & Co. we learn that the barkentine Ethel Blanco arrived at Canoe on Tuesday, the 29th ult., making the run from Liverpool, G. B., in 19 days.

CANADA'S first three female doctors of medicine have graduated at the Kingston women's medical school. Their names are Mrs. McGillivray, Miss Smith, and Miss Beatty.

GEORGE GOODERHAM, of Gooderham & Wort, Toronto, is president of a new association formed by the brewers, distillers and wholesale liquor dealers of the Dominion to fight the Scott Act.

DR. E. J. BARKER, of Kingston, is dead, aged 85 years. He was the father of the Canadian press. In 1834 he founded the British Whig, and in 1855 began the publication of the Daily British Whig, the first daily in the Dominion.

SOLDIERS MAY SHAVE AGAIN.—The order issued some months ago prohibiting the military from shaving is stated to have been cancelled and that on and after May 1st the soldiers will be permitted to use the razor.—Halifax paper.

ON the 20th ult., the inhabitants of Digby, N. S., were startled by the news of the sudden death of Robert Stephen, M. D., who had been in his usual state of health up to the day previous to his death. The Doctor was born in Elgin, Scotland, about the year 1803.

THE Ontario and Quebec railway has decided to commence the survey of a new line from Smith's Falls to Montreal at once, and to commence construction as soon as the survey is completed. This branch will be the longest tangent in America, if not in the world, and will be a perfectly straight line from end to end, a distance of 70 miles.

JOHN S. HENDRIE, of Hamilton, and Mr. Donald McDermid, of Detroit, have been awarded the contract for building on of the heaviest miles of railway on the continent. They have taken the ninth mile of the Canadian Pacific Railway in the Kicking-Horn Pass. The total price for the whole mile is in the neighborhood of \$300,000. D. McDermid and John Ross, with horses and plant, have already left for the scene of operation.

LAUNCHED.—On Tuesday, the 29th ult., from the shipyard of Kumble Coffin, Esq., Mount Stewart, the handsomely modelled and well finished brigantine Z-lion, about 327 tons register, to class 9 years A1 in English Lloyd's, and 11 years in American Record. This vessel was built for Peake Bros. & Co., and reflects much credit on the builder. She was towed to Charlottetown by the steam tug Henry Atken, where she will be fitted out ready for sea.

THE Steamer Beaver, P. T. LeMaistre, Master, carrying mails, is intended to run as follows:—Leave Pictou Landing every Monday, after arrival Express Train, for Magdalen Islands, calling at Georgetown and Souris both going and returning, and every fourth trip, commencing 19th May, will extend to voyage to Gaspe, Port Hood and Mahon, U. E. Leave Pictou Town every Thursday night after arrival of passengers by Accommodation Train, for Mahon, calling at Port Hood both going and returning.

The six days' go-as-you-please pedestrian contest opened at the Madison Square Garden, New York, on Sunday night. There was a vast crowd in attendance. There are fifteen contestants as follows: Burrell, of Pennsylvania; Sullivan, Saratoga; Noremac, New York; Vint, Brooklyn; Rowell, England; Thompson, New York; Nitaw-eg-Ebow, Chippewa Indian of Dakota; Elson, Connecticut; Panchot, Buffalo; Lounsbury, Chicago; Herty, Boston; Fitzgerald, Long Island; Campana, Connecticut; Haines, Pennsylvania; Day, England.

It gives us much pleasure to record that Mr. Stephen Jenkins, son of Dr. Jenkins of this city, has graduated at the University of Pennsylvania with first class honors, and a little to spare. An average of ninety per cent. entitles a graduate to first class honors; Mr. Jenkins' average was within a fraction of ninety-six per cent. He has also won in a competitive examination, which he was induced to try without any preparation, a Hospital resident physicianship. In this he stood third in a list of forty-three candidates. This position he holds for a year. It is an immense advantage to a young physician, as there are upwards of 2,000 beds in the hospital, and the experience acquired is consequently very great.

A MEETING of the Fire Wardens was held last evening—Chief Engineer Large presiding. It was decided to purchase a fire bell of two thousand pounds weight from Messrs. Blake & Co., Boston. Mr. Michael Egan was awarded the contract for removing the old fire bell and replacing the new one. A letter was read from the Secretary of the Salvage Corps asking to be admitted into the Fire Department. The Corps were on motion admitted, and an order was made to bind them over the salvage wagon and other appliances, with the consent of the Council. The estimates for the ensuing year were passed. They amounted to \$4,500. Communications were read from Souris with reference to the purchase of No. 3 Engine, and Capt. Beer was ordered to test and report upon her. A communication agreeing to purchase the Engine Prince Edward at the Department's terms. No further business of importance was transacted, and the meeting adjourned.

AT a meeting of the Dominion rifle association held at Ottawa, yesterday, it was decided to hold the annual competition on the second week of September at the Rideau rifle range. It is too late this season to arrange for a British team to be present as was anticipated.

RUSSIA is still fomenting trouble in Eastern Roumelia with a view of promoting the unification of the two Bulgarias under the Russian protege, Prince Alexander. The unionist press at Philippopolis has begun a bitter attack upon Aleko Pasha, Governor of Eastern Roumelia. It is charged that he has recently stolen outright a quarter of a million dollars of the state's money.

CAPTAIN GRAHAM, the Dominion immigration agent at Winnipeg has returned from a visit to Europe. He considers there will be quite a number of immigrants who will land in Canada during the coming season. Speaking of the Marquis of Lorne, Capt. Graham says he is doing good service to this country. There is scarcely a day but he attends a meeting either to speak in the interests of Canada, or to act as chairman while others speak. He is the best immigration agent Canada ever had. He inquired very particularly about Canada and seemed deeply interested in her welfare.

R. D. FISHER, for seven years teller of the Dominion Bank, Ottawa, married, aged about 35 years, and who has hitherto borne an unexceptionable character, was discovered short in his accounts by the Dominion Bank Inspector. Usually it is Inspector Raine's custom to visit the branch there on the first of every month, and it is possible that Fisher was not expecting Raine, and intended to have his accounts correct against the first of the month. His accounts, however, were found \$1,500 short on a quick and partial examination of the books. After the bank closed on the 22nd ult., Fisher fled, but was captured at Kingston.

THE following law and law case are taken from the records of the New Haven colony in 1669. The statute says: "Whosoever shall inveigle or draw the affections of any male or female servant, either to himself or others, without first gaining the consent of her parents, shall pay to the plantation for the first offence 40 shillings; the second 24; for the third he shall be imprisoned or corporally punished." Under this law, at the court held in May, 1669, Jacobeth Murtime and Sarah Tuttle were prosecuted "for setting down on a chistle together, his arms around her waist, and her arms upon his shoulder or waist, and continuing in that sinful posture about half an hour, in which time he kissed her and she kissed him, or they kissed one another, as ye witnesses testified."

MR. TWEDDY's imported Shire stallion, "Oak's Heart," arrived from England to-day. Notwithstanding his long journey he looks remarkably well. "Oak's Heart" is, in every particular, a handsome and valuable horse. For symmetry and style he is hard to beat. An idea of his size may be obtained by the fact that he, on landing, weighed 1,783 lbs. He can be seen at the stable of Mr. A. N. Large. Referring to Oak's Heart, the Colchester Sun says, "One of the best heavy stallions ever seen in Truro, was for the past few days cared for at the stables of Mr. J. A. Leaman. Oak's Heart is a brown horse, four years old, nearly 17 hands high, sired by Heart of Oak out of a Mr. G. Tweedy, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and those needing agriculturists of P. E. I., and those needing heavy horses, are to be congratulated over the arrival of this noble animal." During his stay at Mr. Leaman's stables he was seen by all of our best horsemen, all of whom thought that as a model draft horse he is perfect on itself, and we think that "Barrister" will have to look to his laurels to hold a lead in position at the bar of public opinion, while this youngster continues to develop. The Great Walk.

NEW YORK, May 1. Great excitement at Madison Square Garden this morning when Fitzgerald got ahead of Rowell, while Rowell was resting on his 335th mile. Fitzgerald has beaten the record at this stage of the walk. The score is now, Fitzgerald, 381; Rowell, 376; Noremac, 352; Vint, 345; Herty, 344; Elsox, 322; Nitaw, 136; Panchot, 332.

NEW YORK, May 1. Fitzgerald is now seven miles ahead of Rowell in the walk.

The Presque Isle Fire.

PRESQUE ISLE, May 1. Fire broke out at 3 a. m. in Johnson & McParr's office, and burned every store in town but two; the Presque Isle hotel, more than twenty buildings in all, the Post Office, two law offices, and many residences. Large quantities of goods were saved. The whole loss will exceed \$200,000. Insurance not half of the loss.

The Condition of the Freight Market.

LONDON, May 1. A meeting of shipowners held at Newcastle yesterday, approved the proposal to lay up one-fourth of their tonnage in view of the present condition of the freight market. The steamers engaged in trading will contribute to the expenses of laying up.

Fifty Workmen Killed.

LONDON, May 1. The walls of one of the buildings of Mr. Whiteley's mercantile establishment, in Westbourne Grove, London, which was partially destroyed by fire last Saturday, collapsed to-day, killing fifty workmen.

BOSTON, May 1. It has been decided by the committee on claims that Roger Amero be allowed nothing as compensation money for his detention and arrest.

Foul Play.

NEW YORK, May 1. Benjamin Wallace, a rich soap manufacturer, is missing. As he had large sums of money in his possession, foul play is suspected.
