Improved Prison Discipline in Australia.

The New South Wales Minister of Justice is introducing some changes in dealing with offenders under twenty-five years of age, and serving sentences not exceeding twelve months. Under the previous Minister regulations were made for treating prisoners of this class with the Spartan simplicity of a plank bed and an occasional diet of bread and water, the object being to make prison life distasteful to young criminals as was consistent with a regard for their health. It has now been decided to have these prisoners put through a course of physical drill, embracing gymnastic and manual exercises of various kinds. This is in line of the ordinary walking exercise they have hitherto had, the idea being that this drill will tend to develop the prisoners' muscles and strengthen their bodies and minds, at the same time inculcating a spirit of discipline which might not otherwise exist. The new system has already been successfully tried in Darlinghurst Gaol, the Sidney Penitentiary, and the only question is how far it can be adopted without interfering with the intended deterrent nature of the punishment. The whole arrangement is being carried out under the supervision of the medical officers of the gaol, and the training is given by a proper instructor. The new physical drill is stated to be very popular with the prisoners. It has the charm of novelty, and lends a little variety to the somewhat monotonous life behind the prison walls. So far, it is stated, the experiment obtained is entirely opposite to any injurious effect; and the beneficial results in creating a distaste for prison life are marked.

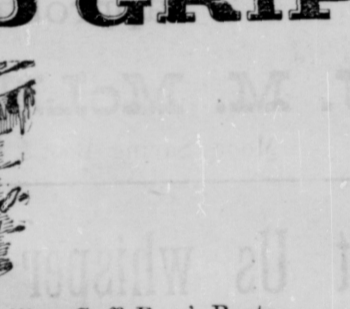

An Australian Shipping Port.

Newcastle, the second largest maritime city in New South Wales, and situated about 100 miles north of Sydney, possesses many features in common with its English name-sake, being the business centre of an immense coal-mining industry, and its port generally being crowded with vessels in search of grimy cargoes. Some idea of the Newcastle export trade in coal may be formed from the fact that the quantity shipped during 1896 was 2,070,304 tons, an increase of 149,926 tons on the preceding year. The number of vessels entering the port during the year was 1,185, representing a tonnage of 1,478,240; the vessels cleared during the same period numbering 1,180, with a tonnage of 1,479,033; making a total trade of 2,957,273 vessels, and a tonnage of 2,957,459. The places for which the coal cargoes were destined, in addition to Australasian ports, included the United States, China, Java, New Caledonia, India, Philippine Islands, Fiji, Mauritius, Peru, Chili, Ceylon, Singapore, Sandwich Islands, New Hebrides, Ecuador, Panama, Mexico, Canada, Celebes, Society Islands, South Sea (British) Islands, Cape Colony, Cochin China, Japan, New Guinea, etc. The total value of the Newcastle exports was £1,496,444, of which £739,444, was represented by the coal. The imports were valued at £611,372, the largest item, £106,798, being for machinery. The leading imports were drapery, wearing apparel, spirits, galvanised iron, kerosene oil, tools, etc., principally from the United Kingdom. The principal food imports, chiefly from the other colonies and America, were flour, wheat, sugar, butter, potatoes, and dried fruits. This is exclusive of the overland trade with Sydney, which is very extensive.

1,000 Miles of Railways

LIKELY TO BE BUILT IN BRITISH COLUMBIA THIS YEAR.

It looks as if British Columbia is to see more railroad building this year than ever before. The Spokane Chronicle estimates that if one-third of those asking for charters are successful in their applications and build one-third of their proposed lines, there will be more than 1,000 miles of road constructed in the Province this year, and many rich regions now without transportation facilities will be opened up.
Contractors are now building the line from Trail to Robson and it is not unreasonable to expect that the road will be continued west from Robson to the boundary country.
The Great Northern expects to enter Kootenay country by a branch line from Bonner's ferry to Nelson, which will be in operation by the middle of summer.
An application is also out for a charter for a road from Lethbridge, North-West Territory, to some point on the Fraser River or Gulf of Georgia. The purpose of the projectors is to tap the Kootenay by a line through Crow's Nest Pass.

It is also quite probable that the Canadian Pacific will build a number of branch lines in British Columbia as it will have to make some more in order to maintain its prestige in what is rapidly becoming the most valuable and important part of Canada.
A gang of men is already engaged in clearing the right of way for the Slocan River branch of the Columbia and Kootenay Railway and another gang of men is clearing the right of way for the C. P. R. road which is to run between Slocan crossing and the Southern end of Slocan Lake, taking in the new town of Slocan City. The Provincial Government will also be asked to grant a charter for an electric road from Penitentiary to numerous points in the Boundary and Trail Creek districts, and to extend south as far as the international boundary where it will connect with the proposed electric line from Spokane.

These are only a few of the many railroads projected in British Columbia, but it is easy to see that the present year is to be a lively one so far as railroad building is concerned in that province.
An indication of the C. P. R.'s activities may be seen in the fact that the Golden Lumber Company of Golden, B. C., has closed a \$50,000 contract with the C. P. R. for railway ties. A new portable saw mill is already in operation on their limits and 1,200 ties per day are being turned out at this mill alone. In addition to this two other camps are engaged in getting out bill timber and ties for the summer contracts. The Company have 175 men on the payroll and already have 35 loaded cars of ties on the siding delivered to the C. P. R.
