**THE FARQUHARSON-
PINEAU VICTORY**

THE electors of the Second District of Queen's approve, they emphatically commend, the government which was maintained, until yesterday, by the vote of the traitor Pineau; they approve, they emphatically commend, the breaking of promises and the heaping up of a great public debt; they have rebuked and discharged from the duty of representing them the man who dared to stand up for the performance of promises to the public—notably the promise to bring about an arbitration of the claims of this Province against the Federal Government; and, while the bulk of them are farmers, they have deliberately preferred to be represented by a doctor.

This is the conclusion that will be arrived at all over the Province and throughout Canada as the news of result of the election of yesterday is flashed along the line. The result is the more remarkable in view of the confidence of Mr. Wise and those who took part in the canvass with him that it would be otherwise. On Friday last, there was as nearly as possible absolute certainty that the issue of the contest would be a victory for the Opposition. The meetings, particularly in the north of the district, seemed to express overwhelming condemnation of Pineau Politics and an Administration which is surely (and not slowly) carrying the Province into bankruptcy and ruin with the accompaniments of heavy taxation and loss of autonomy. The opposition speakers were heard, for the most part with attention and applause. But other influences than those of eloquence were exerted at the last, and Mr. Wise was defeated by a majority of 300.

We shall not just now discuss the nature of those "other influences." We shall not make any charges. The die has been cast, and the second district of Queen's stands before this Province and all Canada as champions of the Farquharson administration, the policy of taxation and debt, and Pineauism. If the majority of the electors are happy, we have no cause for complaint. But it is not unlikely that at least some of the electors, who do not care to stand in the same condemnation as the majority, will inquire a little further into the matter.

As for Mr. Wise he fought the battle of right manfully; and though he has been defeated he can sleep with a clear conscience, and go back to the labors of the farm bearing a mind at ease. The Second District of Queen's has long been Liberal; and, in ordinary circumstances, he could not, in opposition to the Liberals, have expected to win a victory. But in the extraordinary circumstances by which the Farquharson Government is now surrounded—in view of the Government's bad conduct, and the scandalous manner in which he has been treated as a result of his protests against it, Mr. Wise had a right to expect that his old friends would have united with his old opponents and have given him a large majority. But, as in the case of many another man who has worked for the right, in the interest of his country, he has been disappointed.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The rooster will crow this evening over the defeat of the farmer candidate.

—Dr. Douglas joins Pineau in maintaining the Pineau-Farquharson Administration.

—It reported that a West River boy is dead to-day because he drank to much election whiskey yesterday. There ought to be an investigation.

—There is not much Liberal elation about town to-day, and it has been inferred that the leaders regret that more than was necessary was paid for the victory.

—The Farquharson-Pineau government have obtained the services of the doctor they needed so badly. Well perhaps the doctor will bring about an improvement in this case. We shall see.

—The Montreal Gazette remarks that Mr. Sifton's Yukon railway deal drove four Liberal members of Parliament into voting with the Opposition, and against the Government; Dr. Borden's emergency food deal drove ten. According to one measure, therefore, Dr. Borden is more than twice as big a politician as Mr. Sifton.

—The Huntingdon Gleaner (Honest Liberal) holds that the rations case was so bad that the Government should sue the contractor for the return of the money paid to him. The Ottawa Journal (Independent) takes the same line. This would certainly be one way of repairing the wrong, by replacing the cash taken from the treasury, would wipe out a share of its responsibility.

—General Lord William Seymour, who has been in command of the forces in British North America for the past two years, left Halifax on the 9th for London via New York. General Seymour, before departing, issued general orders warmly complimenting the Canadian militia and the Canadian and British regulars for what he considered their very fine work on the occasion of the first of July mobilization of the troops.

—The Moncton Transcript remarks:—"Time brings rapid changes. Three years ago there was not a Liberal nominee in a Lieutenant-Governorship. At the present moment, the gubernatorial chairs of every province excepting Manitoba and Nova Scotia has passed to Liberals; and now Lieut Governor Patterson of Manitoba announces that his term of office has about expired. The judiciary was also almost depleted of Liberal nominees and now this condition is surely changing."

It must be admitted that the Liberals are making the most of their opportunities!

—Mr. John Ramsford, of Clinton, Ont., having made a trip through the Maritime Provinces, writes to the Clinton News-Record the result of his observations thus:

"All through the Maritime Provinces the feeling is everywhere in favour of a change of Government at the next election."

"It's in the air, it's all around. 'Grit and Tory alike look for it and welcome it."

"I need not say that the old school of respectable Liberals deplore and refuse to countenance as vehemently as the most rabid Tory the utter supreme indifference of the Laurier Government to its ante-election pledges. 'Dishonesty may endure for a night, but retribution cometh in the morning.'"
