## New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market continued moving forward last week, hesitant at times but always forward, establishing repeated new highs along the way.

Whether the market was stroked or fleeced with weakness, it seemed to ignore all but the basic economic developments in its continued climb.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up \$1.40 on the week and closed at \$127.30, the highest mark for the average since Oct. 23, 1929.

In the field of foreign affairs, there were lots of diplomatic fireworks. U.S. intervention in the Guatemala revolt of course would have had a tremendous Korean-type influence on the stock market. That didn't happen. Only a handful of stocks of companies with special interests in central America did anything at all.

The Geneva conference on Korea and Indo-China, the conferences of French and Chinese officials, the arrival of Prime Minister Churchill and Foreign Minister Eden in Washington—all were fraught with diplomatic importance, but the stock market didn't especially care.

The five most active issues this week on the New York stock exchange were:

Packard off 1/4 at 3 3/4 on 275,600 shares; General Electric up 5/4 at 47 1/2; Studebaker up 1/2 at 18 1/2; Radio Corp. up 1/2 at 29 3/4; Reynolds Tobacco "B" off 1/4 at 35 1/2.

The five most active issues this week on the American stock exchange were:

Webb and Knapp up 1/4 at 14 1/4; Pacific Petroleum up 3/4 at 7 3/4; Canadian Atlantic Oil up 1-16 at 3 15-16; Sapphire Petroleum up at 2 9-16; Ford Motor of France up 3 1-8 at 1 3-16.

Most Canadian stocks were lower. Hiram Walker was down 1/2, McIntyre was off 1/2, International Nickel off 1/2, and Canadian Pacific, off 1/2. Distillers Seagram, however, gained 1/4.

## U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND (AP)—Metalworking executives and mill bosses predict the steel business in the United States will improve during the second half of this year, Steel magazine said Saturday.

The metalworking journal declared that some steel executives "predict ingot operations will advance above 80 per cent of capacity before year-end."

The rate during the first half year averaged 71 per cent of the U.S.'s rated capacity of about 123,000,000 tons annually.

Summarizing returns from a questionnaire it sent to 5,039 metalworking executives, the magazine said that 39 per cent of those replying to the questionnaire see an increase in volume in last year as against 24.5 per cent who anticipate a decrease, and 27.5 expecting no change.

Any increase, however, would not be immediate. The magazine predicted that for the next few weeks the market will remain sluggish because of the July 4 holiday and the start of mass vacations in industry.

One of the main reasons executives predict an upswing in business is that their customers by now have used up the inventories maintained during the Korean war.

Those reserve supplies kept firms from ordering from the mills until they were exhausted.

The magazine's arithmetical price composites held steady: at \$114.20 for finished steel and at \$27.83 for steelmaking scrap.

## Discussed Fish Inspection Measures

OTTAWA, June 23 — Deputy Minister of Fisheries Stewart Sains today described as "a significant step forward" a federal-provincial meeting in Ottawa on Monday to reach general agreement on co-operative measures to bring about more effective fish inspection in Canada.

H. V. Dempsey, Director of the Inspection and Consumer Service of the federal Department of Fisheries, outlined to representatives of the ten provinces at the meeting the Department's proposals for the quality control of fresh and frozen fish and minimum standards of construction, equipment, sanitation, and operation of plants producing these products.

In co-operation with the fishing industry, the Department early this year completed a coast-to-coast survey of more than 500 fresh, frozen, salt and pickled fish plants which handle fish for provincial or international trade.

As a result of this survey the Department held discussions in March to draft minimum standards so that it will be possible to maintain peak quality from the time fish are caught until they reach the consumer. The meeting yesterday was called so that the fullest consultation could be held with the provinces on the proposals set forth by the Department.

The provincial representatives signified the interest of their respective provinces in such measures. They will report to their governments and subsequent discussions will be held regarding the possibility of introducing provincial legislation which would complement similar regulations proposed by the federal Department of Fisheries.
