CURING CANCER.

Physicians Declare That the Knife Treatment is Not Necessary.

Dr. C. Lenox Curtis, No. 30 West P. O. street and Dr. Rowland D. Jones, of No. 45 West Fifty-ninth street, who attended Dr. Edward W. Burnette of No. 122 West Thirty-fourth street, who died of cancer September 27 last, have prepared a report on the subject which will be printed in one of the medical papers in a few weeks. They say they have ample evidence to show beyond question that Dr. Burnette's case is one of inoculation. They will also endeavor to show that cancer can be cured by simply giving medicine, and that it is not necessary in all cases to use the knife in order to remove a cancerous growth.

The World printed the time ago an interview with Dr. Paul Gillet, considered by many the best authority on bacteriology in this country, who said that there is no longer a doubt among advanced scientific men that cancer is a contagious disease, and seemed certain that Dr. Burnette was inoculated from his patient.

Dr. Curtis is a specialist on cancer and a recognized authority on the disease. He has studied in Berlin under Prof. Koch, and in Vienna under Prof. Virchow, both celebrated physicians. Dr. Curtis, who attended Dr. Burnette shortly before his death, and they both performed an autopsy on his body. The physicians concluded that it was not necessary to undertake an operation, and they treated the case by simply giving powerful medicines.

"The case was one of malignant cancer," said Dr. Curtis yesterday, "and it is of exceeding interest. There is sufficient evidence to prove beyond question that it was a case of inoculation from patient to patient. The latter, however, is still living."

Dr. Curtis explained that Dr. Burnette had shaved himself one morning and had his cheek caught in the razor. He scratched the cut after putting his finger in the cancerous patient's mouth. In twenty minutes he felt a burning pain in his cheek, and in the day he had a cancer on the cheek. This was treated, but not thoroughly cured. The cancer next appeared in the liver.

"Under the medicine was taken by Dr. Burnette," said Dr. Curtis, "the tumor diminished in the course of ten days. The autopsy showed that the cancer was nearly dried up. He died of heat exhaustion, and it is not seen for the hot spell Dr. Burnette, I believe, would be living to-day. We have made thorough researches, and find that there is no cancer traceable in Dr. Burnette's family."

Dr. Curtis said that the report would show beyond the shadow of a doubt that cancer could be cured by simply giving medicine. "I don't think it necessary to use the knife at all," he said. "All we gave Dr. Burnette was medicine, and the poison was eliminated from the system."

SEAL HUNTING.

How It is Done by the Hunters of Labrador. The hooded seals are not so timid. They are fully twice as large as the harp, and will often show fight, particularly if their young are not old enough to swim. As they may be approached with ease, it is considered a waste of ammunition to shoot them, and they are generally clubbed, or "batted," as it is locally termed. They are found in flocks of three on a pan—the dog, the female and the pup.

The dogs, which sometimes attain 1000 pounds in weight, are quite fierce, and clubbing them is always attended with some danger. In spite of their size, they are exceedingly active, and will travel over the ice much faster than a man can run. If the dog is not killed by the first blow it sometimes requires a hard fight to finish him.

When wounded or angered he puffs out his great red hood, which consists of a hard cartilage or membrane secreted inside the nostrils. When extended, this is over a foot in diameter. It is attached to the nose by flexible ligaments, and is impervious to even a rifle ball. He uses this to protect himself, swinging it from side to side with such dexterous rapidity as to enable him to catch it as it descends. At this moment the pup must spring forward and deliver a crushing blow upon the animal's exposed forehead. That is what was done by the dog and his mate, but if he falls of his mark by even a hand's breadth, he must then look out for himself—Outing.

A Duck Drive in China. What would the reader think of seeing a farmer traveling to market with as many ducks as could be crowded into more than the space of the park between the City Hall and the Post-office in New York City—a mass or perhaps two city blocks of duck flesh and feathers? That was what was driven past us on the Grand Canal one day. Two men in two boats were driving the ducks before them, all as thick as the ducks themselves, and swimming. Each man carried a long bamboo rod with the heart of a palm leaf on the end of it. With this he kept the ducks in a line, and in mass in order. He whipped back into its place every duck that sagged out of the mass, or that lagged behind, and kept the ducks in a line through the water. Sudden gusts of wind came along in the opposite direction—a big chop boat and two or three small boats were sailing swiftly before a fresh breeze directly down upon the acre or two of ducks. There seemed no way of preventing a terrible slaughter of poultry. The big chop boat, like the house blow, before a gale, sped towards the advancing feathered host, and at last the birds were in the way were almost under her bows. The latter seized many square yards of ducks, the immense flock broke apart, a crack in it opened before the chop boat and widened into the boat swept through, a conical that divided the flock. Not one duck was run over—Harpers' Magazine.
