

Boston Bruins Defeat New York Rangers 6-2

NEW YORK (AP) — Boston Bruins cracked the Ranger defence for four goals in the second period that carried them to a 6-2 victory over New York Wednesday night in the Madison Square Garden National Hockey League season opener. The Bruins moved into a first place tie with the Montreal Canadiens.

Six different Boston players figured in the scoring as Bruins posted their second straight success whipping New York 3-1 Sunday night in Boston.

After Real Chevrefils of Boston and Parker MacDonald of New York scored in the first period, the Bruins broke the game wide open in the next period.

With the Rangers short-handed, Don McKenney put Boston ahead 2-1 in the opening two minutes, tipping in the shot past Ranger goalie Gump Worsley. Less than a minute later, Larry Regan converted a rebound that put the Bruins ahead 3-1.

The Rangers got back into the game briefly on Larry Popein's goal midway in the period, but the Bruins pulled away once again.

Johnny Bucyk outmanoeuvred the Ranger defence and scored a 10:41 and Bronco Horvath, a former Ranger, feinted Worsley out of position to drill home the fifth goal late in the period.

Don Simmons in the Bruins' final tally in the third period, scoring unassisted.

Chevrefils' goal was scored from close range. MacDonald, with less than two minutes in the period remaining, fired in a 25-footer to tie it.

Don Simmons in the Bruins' net had 24 saves, while Worsley turned aside 22 shots for New York.

Ambrose and Gallant were also charged with obstructing a peace officer. Roberts faced additional charges of having untaxed deer pelts in their possession. No date was set for resumption of their hearings.

DETROIT (AP)—Detroit Tigers today announced the purchase of outfielder Jim Greengrass from Sacramento Solons of the Pacific Coast League.

The veteran flycatcher is 30 and has previous major league experience with Cincinnati Redlegs and Philadelphia Phillies. His best year was 1953 when he batted .285 and drove in 100 runs for the Redlegs.

Greengrass hit .283 for Sacramento last season and batted in 76 runs.

Neal Ball Dies Tuesday

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP)—Neal Ball, first major league baseball player to make an unassisted triple play, died Tuesday. He was 76.

He made that famous play July 19, 1909, against Boston while playing shortstop for Cleveland during his second season in the majors.

Ball's first two batters, Heinie Wagner and Jake Stahl, had hit safely and were on second and first. Andy McConnell hit a three-two pitch.

SNARES LINE DRIVE

"It was a line drive just above my head," Ball once told a reporter, "and over toward second base."

"I thought I could spear it and had visions of a double play. I reached into the air, and came down with the ball."

"By this time Wagner was on third base and Stahl was only a few feet from second."

"I ran over and touched second, making two out. Stahl was slowing up and had to reverse his tracks toward first."

"I knew I could overtake him, and I raced down and put the ball on him to complete the triple play and retire the side."

Cleveland won 6-1 and Ball hit a home run and a double before the afternoon was over.

May Have Club In Ebbets Field

NEW YORK (AP)—Marvin Kratter, who purchased Ebbets Field with the idea of building a housing project, disclosed Wednesday that there still is a chance the former home of the Brooklyn Dodgers would house a major or minor league ball club.

Kratter said he already has been approached indirectly by a club investigating the possibility of replacing the Dodgers, and if, within a year, another club makes a deal to move into Brooklyn, he would abandon the housing project and enlarge Ebbets Field for the new tenant.

If a deal was made the field would be enlarged and renovated at a cost of \$3,000,000 or \$4,000,000.

Walter O'Malley, Dodgers president, moved the Dodgers to Los Angeles a week ago.

Explains Reason For Money Loss

NEW YORK (AP)—Baseball secretary Charles Segar Wednesday put his finger on the \$83,000 received for a pre-game world series television show in 1955 as the reason for the difference in the winning shares of this year's Milwaukee Braves and the '55 Brooklyn Dodgers.

"The \$83,000 also went into the players' pool," explained Segar. "We did not have a pre-game show this year and that is why the Braves' full shares were less than the Dodgers'."

The figures announced Tuesday by commissioner Ford Frick revealed that \$709,027.55 went into the players' pool in 1957. In 1955, the total hit \$737,853.59 and this included the pre-game TV monies.

This accounted for the difference of more than \$300 per winning series share—\$9,768.21 for Brooklyn players and \$8,924.36 for the Braves.



270 Cwt. Yield In Aroostook

PRESQUE ISLE, Me. (AP)—Aroostook potato farmers are cleaning up the harvest of a crop 11 per cent smaller than last year's but nine per cent above the 1949-55 average.

The agriculture department estimated the crop at 37,260,000 hundredweight.

The yield per acre—270 hundredweight—"is turning out better than anticipated," the statement said.

Harvesting progressed rapidly with good weather in September and is practically complete. This is the largest, single potato producing area in the U.S.
