

Party Leaders In House Pay Tribute To Dowager Queen

"We have safety in the persons and character of those who will rule us in the future," Premier J. Walter Jones said in the Legislature as he drew the attention of Members of the House to the strong position of the Throne in Great Britain during his personal tribute to the late Dowager Queen Mary.

The Premier briefly traced the Royal family history through the past century and reminded the Legislature that breeding paid an important part in the production of our monarchs as he said that there was more than environment involved in shaping a ruler of the country.

Noting her age of 85 at the time of her death, the speaker said that out as itself was not remarkable, but Queen Mary had had a remarkable career. Her dominating personality had maintained unity in a large family and through three wars she had kept working steadily because duty to her country was her outstanding characteristic.

There will be no proclamation for public mourning. But millions of Britons mourned in their own private way the death of the gracious dowager of Marlborough House. And messages of sympathy poured in to the Royal Family from world leaders.

Churchill Pays Tribute In the words of Prime Minister Churchill, whose path had crossed Queen Mary's repeatedly through two wars and in five reigns: "She looked like a Queen. She acted like a Queen. Her death leaves a void in our hearts and the life of the nation, a void which will be hard indeed to fill." Introducing in the House of Commons a formal expression of sympathy to the Queen, Churchill said Queen Mary had been a pillar of strength to the Royal Family and the nation in troubled times and had endeared herself to her people by her personality, her example and her bearing. The House of Commons and the House of Lords adopted similar expressions of sympathy with Elizabeth "in her grievous loss."
