**Big Weekend For All Sports**

Another big weekend in sport but things went pretty well as expected with the exception of the Montreal-Boston game Saturday evening. The Bruins skated for the full 60 minutes of that match and generally outshined the speedy Habs. Rookie netminder Bernie Parent came up with a sterling display, getting in front of the puck, and several times stopping what looked like sure tallies. A lot of people noticed that Forbes Kennedy got no ice time at all and were wondering if he was even dressed. He was on the bench and was wearing sweater 14. By the way, Stewart's goal was one of the nicest to be seen in some little while on CBC coverage.

Canadiens got revenge Sunday as they downed the Bruins 5-2; drawing markers from five different sharpshooters. Again Parent was brilliant and without his standout play the Habs would have been in the double figures. At one point Parent scrambled and stopped six straight drives as well as outguessing several Habs with breakaways. Three of the Canadian goals came as the result of multiple rebounds. Kennedy apparently was given some ice time Sunday for he recorded his first point of the season, an assist on Fleming's goal. It's too bad that it had to be for a losing cause.

Bobby Hull must really love those Toronto Leafs! He has had opportunity to face them only twice in the young season and yet he is the proud possessor of nine points as the result of his play in the two matches. Both times Hull has recorded hat tricks against the lowly Leafs and last evening, just to show that he is not a puck hog, he added three assists to his league leading eleven goals. Hull now leads the league in scoring with seventeen points. The fact that Doug Mohns garnered his seventh marker of the season in Sunday night's match was overshadowed by Hull's strong showing. One wonders just how long these two can maintain their assault on the opposing goalies.

It took Eddie Shack exactly 38 seconds to let fans know that he was back in the league for at that time in the first period in the game against the Hawks he and Stan Mikita squared off. Then at 19:35 of the final stanza big Eddie engaged in a bit of fisticuffs with none other than Hull, who has finally decided to do a bit about the pounding that he is subjected to every game. Shack ended the game with a hat trick in penalties, only one of which led to the Tribe's tallying.

New York and the Leafs locked horns in a real thriller Saturday evening and it was not until the Rangers' Donnie Marshall pumped a goal into the empty Toronto net at the 19:32 mark that the Rangers were assured of two points.

**THEN THERE WAS FOOTBALL**

A lot of great football matches were contested on Saturday and Sunday and the net result is that the Ottawa Roughies will meet the Ti-Cats in the Eastern CFL final, Winnipeg Blue Bombers are set to face the Calgary Stamps in the west and the Baltimore Colts now are atop the National football league race.

"Annihilation by interception" was the way Jim Trimble summed up the Al's loss to the Ottawa club and he couldn't have been more correct. Some critics were on Frank Clair's back for having had his club devote most of last week to pass defense but the squads 36-7 triumph makes the coach look like some kind of a fortune teller. One was batted down, one hit the posts and the final one was caught at the sideline by that great little receiver Good. However, with a clear road to the end zone he was forced to step out of bounds and to all intents and purposes the Roughies season ended on that play.

In the National Football League that great Detroit line defense anchored by 300 pound lineman Rodger Brown, stifled the Green Bay Packer offense and held the Packers rushers to MINUS two yards. At the same time the Lions successfully stopped the Packer passing game and held Starr to one touchdown. Final score—12-7 for the Lions. This game is very reminiscent of the match that these same two clubs played in 1963 when the Motor Towners upset the favored Packers and the Chicago Bears went on to win the world championship. Baltimore won Sunday and took over the league leadership with a 7-1 record and at the same time put the resurging Chicago Bears all but out of the playoff picture. Score in the Colts big win over the Bears was a close 36-21.

Closer to home one of the most amazing defensive records ever to be recorded in Maritime football was snapped Saturday as the Acadia Axemen scored against the powerful X-Men. This was the first time in more than five hours of football that anyone had managed to cross the X-Men's goal line. That will be some game this weekend between X and SMU for the Maritime title although X should take the match handily.
