New York Stocks
NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market hesitated last week near the top of an advance that in the first six months of this year sent the averages to the highest territory since 1929.
The hesitation was brief—as the week ended shares were rising again. As the first half of 1954 ended, The Associated Press average of 60 important stocks stood just a shade below its high point since Oct. 22, 1929.
That point—\$128.30—was reached on Tuesday of last week, on a day when the market was hit by a wave of selling that left the ticker unable to keep abreast of transactions. By the end of the day Super Cola advanced 1/4 at 2 1/4 on 900 shares and Electric Bond and Share up 1/4 at 22 on 58,800 shares.
Canadian stocks were mixed on the final day Friday. International Nickel gained 1/4. Distillers Seagram advanced 1/4 and Dome Mines fell 1/4.
Canadian issues on the American stock exchange were quiet.

U. S. Steel Report
CLEVELAND (CP) — Increasing prices will not weaken the steel industry's competitive position, Steel Magazine said today, because the effects of pay hikes won by the CIO United Steelworkers union "will spread ultimately" to other metals.
The \$3 a ton average jump in the price of steel was an effort to pass along the additional costs of the new contract between steel producers and the union, the metalworking journal added.

Seismic Crews' Vital Job In Oil Industry
TULSA, Okla. (AP) — One of the oil industry's most vital jobs is that of the seismic crews who sound the earth's rock strata for structures which might bear petroleum.
They work with precisely engineered, highly-sensitive equipment which records the vibrations set off by dynamite-created "earthquakes."
Their instruments must be delicate enough to detect a sound as soft as a raindrop on the ground, rugged enough to withstand extremes in weather and topographic conditions.
They are the result of painstaking research by engineers and careful manufacture by skilled mechanics and wiring men in laboratories such as Carter Oil Co. maintains here. In its custom-designed seismicograph equipment is made for use all over the world solely by affiliates of the Standard Oil Co. New Jersey.
Last year \$750,000 was spent equipping or serving 27 seismic crews for Imperial, Creole, International, Standard Vacuum and Carter.
CLIMATIC CHALLENGE
A complete set of seismic equipment includes geophones, amplifiers, geophone and inter-connecting cables, cameras and communication instruments.
Nearly every piece must be custom-designed to meet the challenge of climate and topography where it is used.
In one section of the laboratory equipment is "tropicalized" to work in the tropics' intense heat and humidity. Other instruments are tested in a "cold chamber" to determine whether they will operate properly in an arctic winter's sub-zero temperatures.
Carter-designed machinery takes some strange shapes to cope with the various conditions under which it will be used. There's the swamp vehicle, a metal canoe with stern wheel drive to push it through Venezuela's swamps. The same drive can move it over dry land.
A muskeg vehicle, a barge-like boat with caterpillar treads, transports seismic crews over thousands of acres of muskeg country from southern Canada to the Arctic circle.
said that the industry's executives are speaking out against low earnings. The magazine also said that the cost had been absorbed by the mills, the "union would conclude that the industry could afford even more and bigger settlements."
Ernest T. Weir, National Steel Corporation chairman, was quoted as saying the industry's earnings are not big enough to maintain the "investor's confidence" that is needed to finance plant improvements. The magazine also quoted the National City Bank of New York as reporting the industry's net profit last year at 11.5 per cent of net worth—compared with an average of 12.5 for all industries.
New pacts with the union cost mills between 10 and 12 cents a man hourly and the magazine estimated each cent of pay increase raised the cost of producing steel by 4 cents.
Wildcat strikes, vacations and the July 4 holiday cut production last week by six points, to 67 per cent of the nation's rated capacity. That would be 1,600,000 net tons, the least this year.

Seismic Crews' Vital Job In Oil Industry

New Defence Minister Gets Down To Work

OTTAWA (CP) — Affable, rotund Ralph Campney bounced into "A" building at national defence headquarters bright and early Friday to take over as Canada's new defence minister.
Though appointed only Thursday as successor to the retiring Brooke Claxton, the Vancouver lawyer finds the wartime buildings not unfamiliar. He was associate defence minister from Feb. 12, 1953, Mr. Campney, who appears much younger than his 60 years, looked like a man ready to get down to hard work. His post is one of the most grueling in Ottawa.
"I'm used to working long hours and I'm O. K. so far," he told a reporter. "My wife thinks I work too hard but it doesn't show in my weight. I'm a little heavier than I care to be and I've been doing a bit of reducing. I feel better for it."
He and his staff have occupied a suite of offices across the hall from Mr. Claxton's but will move into the former defence minister's premises.
SERVED OVERSEAS
"I hope to get settled in by next week," said Mr. Campney, who served overseas for four years in the First World War with the Medical Corps, 19th Infantry Battalion and the Royal Flying Corps.
"I realize how important this job is, and how very exacting and strenuous. I've had some experience with it and I think it will be intensely interesting."
"I hope to have visited all defence installations before the summer is over. That is, the ones I haven't seen, because I've already visited a number of them."
In this respect, he will be following in the footsteps of Mr. Claxton, an inveterate traveller and questioner.

Forecasts Boost In United States Unemployment

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Planning Association said today unemployment in the United States will nearly double over the next year at the present rate of economic activity. It urged the government to consider action to end "inexcusable" idleness of part of the country's gigantic production machine.
The association's economic report said that if the economy runs along over the next 12 months at about the present pace a \$25,000,000 gap will develop between national production and the level of employment that would provide full employment.
The study group, a private association of business men, labor union leaders, economists and bankers, said it assumes the administration now is re-examining defence needs.
If the administration decides there is no "urgent need" for stepped up defence spending, the group said, "then measures should be considered to promote expansion" of the economy to "full employment" levels.
