HOW TO GET MOST OUT OF THE COW.

(Continued from page 3.)

asked Mr. Gould, "that turnips will produce more milk than mangles?" "By feeding them," said Mr. Russel, who is something of an observer himself.

"By feeding turnips for a week I have found the milk flow greater than during the succeeding week when I fed mangles."

"Well," replied Mr. Gould, I saw a statement in a recent issue of Hoard's Dairyman, which put mangles first, sugar beets second and turnips third. This was the standing, in the amount of milk flow, secured by the use of these foods. But even if turnips gave 20 per cent. more milk I would not use them because of the objectionable flavor."

Mr. Brandon was inclined to favor turnips. "We get the highest price in the local market for our home made butter," said he, "and still turnips are used by us as feed. But none of the flavor of the turnips is to be found in the butter itself. I tested this by submitting a sample to Henry Purvis, one of your patrons, and he could not detect the slightest flavor of the roots in the butter. But I feed the turnips directly after milking, morning and night."

"Perhaps," said Mr. Gould, "it is not so much the turnip as the time it is fed. But where you will find one man feed it at the proper time you will find nine who will feed it at all times, and if one man furnishes turnip milk he will destroy the product of the whole factory."

SURROUNDINGS OF THE CATTLE.

"Now," said Mr. Gould, as he turned to the concluding part of his talk, "let us deal with the surroundings of the cattle."

"By surroundings I refer particularly to the stabling. We have had three periods in barn building in Canada. We had first the old log barn. Then came the 40x60 barn, on posts, two feet above the ground, with a lean-to on the ground, which was kept for cows, while sheep and other animals ran in the open. The third period came when we raised the old barns and put stone walls underneath to form a stabling. In these walls were put three panes 7x3 over the door, then three more at the side, so that we could see to curvy the horses, while at the side where the cows were there was no light at all. This was the greatest mistake of all. Sunlight is the most thorough disinfectant we have."

BANKING NOT NECESSARY.

"Don't you approve of the banked barn," asked one.
"No," was the answer, "and I don't think it is necessary. In my stable there are two thicknesses of

board on the outside, a lining of paper, a four-inch space, and then two thicknesses of board inside. No frost comes into that building, and it costs less to build these walls than it would to dig away a bank, such as forms a part of some of the buildings.

"Have plenty of light in your stables," added the speaker emphatically. We have 108 panes 10x14 in our stables. The place is so well furnished with windows that on a moonlight night we can see to do all the work inside without a light, with the exception of putting down the records of each cow on the sheets. Have plenty of room over head, too. Nothing less than nine feet in the clear, and if you have ten feet all the better."

NO NEED TO GO OUTSIDE.

"Do you think it would be better to let your cows out in winter on sunny days?" asked one.

"No answered Mr. Gould, "mine will not be let out again until June. They get all the sunshine they need in the stable itself. The cow is the best judge in this. Turn her out on the finest day in winter, leave the stable door open and you will see she will not stay ten minutes outside. This shows she is more comfortable inside than outside. As for exercise cows get all they need of that in masticating their food. Calamity Jane fairly groaned under this labor when she was under the dairy test at Guelph."

"See, too, that there is plenty of salt. In winter we put salt into the food three times per week. In the summer salt is always put where the animals can help themselves. We do not use rock salt, because it takes too long for the animals to get at it."

SALT AND WATER.

"Do you prefer a running stream or a supply from a tank?" asked Mr. Sproule, dealing with the matter of water.

"I prefer a tank," answered Mr. Gould.

"Even in summer?" added Mr. Sproule.

"In summer a running stream is all right," said Mr. Gould, "but very few people have it. A mere pool which the cattle stand in is objectionable."

"Can you get the cattle to take salt enough to stimulate their thirst and so increase their milk flow?"

"I don't know how you can get an animal to take more than he wishes."

THIS IS UP-TO-DATE FARMING.

In reply to another question Mr. Gould said that last week he threshed 1600 bushels of oats in fourteen hours. All the straw from the threshing went through the cutting-box, the box being handled by two men, and baled into the mows. "It was a strange sight," said Mr. Gould. "To one passing along the road it would seem as if two engines were being used for the purpose of threshing—one at the front and one at the back of the barn. But the one at the front was running the cutting box. This cutting-box is one of Wilkinson's cutters; it has a 14-inch throat, three knives and cost \$190. That machine cut and stowed away the straw from 1,600 bushels of oats in fourteen hours. But the feeder of the thresher must know his business in order to do this. It will not do to throw the sheaves into the cylinder; they must be spread out as they go in. The same cutter will cut 100 tons of ensilage in a day. There is a great advantage in having the straw cut. With cut straw you preserve all the liquid in the manure from the cow stable, and the liquid forms one-third of the value of the whole. Haul the manure to the field as soon as made. There never was a greater mistake than the idea that you kill foul seeds by heating the manure. Put your manure on a field where a hoe crop is to be raised. As soon as the weeds show the first leaves above the ground cultivate and the leaves will die. That is the quickest way to kill weeds I know of."

DEVELOPMENT OF OUR EXPORT BUTTER TRADE.

Speaking of our butter market in England Mr. Gould said: "In 1888 we sent \$4,000,000 worth of wagon grease to the Old Country. Denmark was then coming to the front in dairying, and her superior product soon practically drove our butter out of the British market. In 1895 our exports were \$600,000. This opened our eyes to the necessity of improving our product. We did improve it, and as a result, we shipped in 1899 \$5,200,000 worth of butter to the English market."

from our factory," put in Mr Sproule.
"The amount that Canada sent," went on the speaker, "was only a fraction of the whole, as Great Britain's exports of butter amount to \$80,000,000 per year. By finding a market for the butter in England we not only get the benefit of the trade so created, but we increase the value of the butter left at home; and about 90 per cent. of our butter is after all sold in the Canadian market. It is not many years since American cheese controlled the English cheese market. Now we control that market, and every consumer in England asks for Canadian cheese. This is because the Americans allowed their quality to go down while we have kept our quality up to the highest possible standard. Let us do the same thing in butter, and we will soon have as good a market in the Old Country for butter as we now have for cheese."

POINTS MADE BY MEMBERS.

G. H. Shipman, secretary of the Cannington Creamery Company, emphasized the importance of every man in the neighborhood doing his part in supplying milk to the factory. "If all supply milk," said he, "to the fullest possible extent we can reduce the cost of manufacturing our butter by one-half. Thomas Russell, who is occupying the Judge McIntyre farm, said that then he lived in Mariposa there was the greatest rivalry between producers to see who could produce the largest quantity of milk. He would like to see the same thing at Cannington."

President Jenkins said that no one could fail to see the benefit of the factory, which was now in its second year. The standard of the product of the factory had been continually rising in the Toronto market, and an evidence of the popularity of Cannington butter was found in the fact that a shipment had recently been made to Jamaica.

Manager Sproule said there had been some little trouble during the fall with bad odors, but that was now at an end, and all were now trying to produce the best quality of milk. "There is," he added, "one trouble, and that is, that sometimes the milk is delivered frozen to the cans. The part so frozen is the most valuable part of the contents and as it is not always possible to extract this during the hurry of unloading there is loss of butter in this way. The milk should be kept just above freezing point."

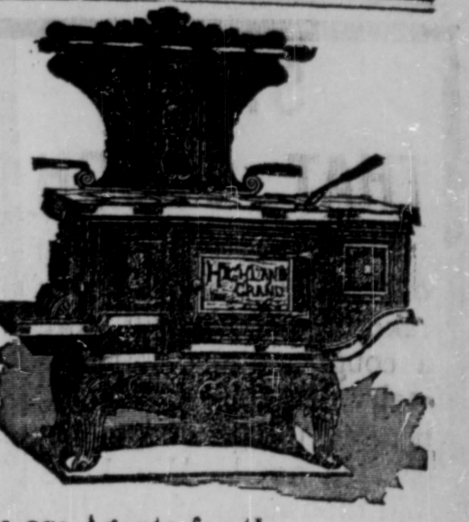
