Meeting of Parliament.
Opinion of the "Free Press."
A Healthy Financial Situation.
OTTAWA, Mar. 7.
It is understood that Parliament will meet on April 29th.
The Ottawa Free Press says, editorially, that if Satan himself was Premier of Canada and had Judas Iscariot for his Minister of Finance, he would have no difficulty in getting a majority in New Brunswick.
The revenue and expenditure returns to March 1st show a surplus of nearly four million dollars.
During the past month the net debt of the Dominion has been reduced about half a million.

Majorities in New Brunswick.

A SPLENDID RECORD.

ST. JOHN, N. B., March 7.
The majorities in New Brunswick seats are: Northumberland, Adams (Con.), 474; Westmorland, Wood (Con.), 1906; Restigouche, McAulister (Con.), 218; Victoria, Costigan (Con.), 803; Charlotte, Gilmore (Lib.), 238; King's, Foster (Con.), 36; Gloucester, Burns (Con.), 376; Sunbury, Wilmont (Con.), 237; Albert, Dr. Weldon (Con.), 104; Carleton, Colton (Lib.), 156; York, Temple (Con.), about 300; Kent, Legere (Con.), by a small majority; St. John City, McLeod, 536; St. John County, Hazen, 1101; Skinner, 739. Queens still in doubt, King (Lib.), probably elected by 23.
OTTAWA, March 6.
This morning's returns give Ontario 43 government and 43 opposition with Algoma to hear from, which is good for the Government. Quebec gives 31 Government and 30 opposition. The Huntingdon election has not yet been held.
Manitoba returns four Government and one opposition.
The Government's majority is probably 43. The new house will likely stand 129 to 86.
This morning's Empire gives the Government 121 and the opposition 83, with eleven places to hear from which will increase the majority.
The Globe gives no opinion.
