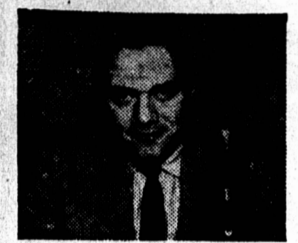

Education Week At St. Teresa's School

Reverend J. B. Croken, P. F. Mr. J. J. Kenny, Secretary of Trustees, members of St. Teresa's Women's Institute, and interested parents were among the visitors to St. Teresa's School during Education Week.

On Wednesday afternoon there was "Open House" when the parents and visitors had an opportunity to see some lessons in progress and to examine some of their children's school work.

In the Senior Classroom an interesting debate was heard and was judged by Mr. J. J. Kenny, Mrs. Anna Bradley, and Mrs. Ernie Bradley. The speakers on the debate were: Anna Evans, Mary Curran and Jeanette Kenny against Marjorie Trainor, Eleanor McInnis, and Marion Gromley.

Then the parents saw the pupils conduct a meeting. A short program consisting of singing, choral speaking and a playette was presented.

Besides the entries sent to the Provincial Poster Contest, the pupils had a poster contest in their own school. They had two classes -- those which were handicapped, and others which had cutout pictures and suitable slogans.

The first class was judged by Mrs. Joseph Trainor who decided the prize should go to Beverly Coulter, Grade VIII. Mary Curran, Grade VIII won the prize in the second class which was judged by Mrs. Thomas Evans.

When the visitors went into the Junior Class, they saw Grade II dramatize one of their Literature lessons, "Sleepy Sam"; the primary pupils also had a program prepared consisting of reading, choral speaking and a playette. The winner of their school poster contest for Education Week was Jane Curran, Grade V.

The teachers and pupils were pleased that these visitors came during Education Week to become better acquainted with the work being done in the school, in the most important task in our society -- the education of youth.

Mar. Winter Fair Meeting Held

AMHERST, N. S., March 14 -- (CP)--The 1951 Maritime Winter Fair had a deficit of \$4,415 and the prize money was the highest in its history, the Maritime Stock Breeders' Association was told today.

F. George MacLeod of Black River, N. B., was re-elected president at the Association's annual meeting, attended by prominent livestock breeders from all parts of the Maritimes, Allison Proffitt of Freetown was selected Prince Edward Island vice-president while W. P. Lusby of Amherst and W. R. Trueman of Aulac were re-elected Nova Scotia and New Brunswick vice-presidents.

Protests Foreign Aid Program

WASHINGTON, March 14--(AP)--An angry protest against the size of the Truman administration's \$7,900,000,000 foreign-aid program, Senator Tom Connally (Dem.-Tex.) said today that the United States "can't go on forever appropriating large sums of money" to foreign countries.

"We are under no obligation to do so," shouted Connally, who heads the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and supports most Truman foreign policy.

W. Averill Harriman, Mutual Security administrator, said he regards the amounts provided in the programs as "on the low side."
