DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Tributes to the Late Mr. Perry

OTTAWA, March 2.—In the House of Commons, yesterday, Sir Wilfrid Laurier drew attention to the death of Mr. S. F. Perry, M. P., of West Prince, P. E. Island, paying a well deserved tribute to his loyalty to his party and his principles, his devotion to his public duties and courtesy towards his opponents.

Sir Charles Tupper reciprocated Mr. Laurier's remarks, and bore testimony to Mr. Perry's unfailing courtesy as a member of the House.

Sir Louis Davies recalled his early associations with Mr. Perry, who had been a prominent figure in the public life of P. E. Island since 1854, and bore testimony to his integrity and party loyalty, and the high esteem in which he was held by his political opponents as well as by his political friends, whom he always regarded with the fullest confidence and warmest friendship.

The debate on the Yukon contract was then resumed.

THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS.

Close Call for the Government.

A MAJORITY OF FORTY-SIX REDUCED TO ALMOST NOTHING.

Conservatives Hopeful that Full Returns Will Give Them a Small Majority

OTTAWA, March 2.—There is still doubt about several seats, but the returns made up here give the Government of Ontario 47 and the Opposition 43, with 2 Patrons and 1 Independent, and Russell not yet polled.

North Toronto (Conservative) and Halton (Liberal) are carried by a majority of only one each.

Two Ministers are defeated which will make it necessary for Hon. Mr. Hardy, to open two constituencies.

TORONTO, March 2.—At 10 o'clock last night it looked as if Hon. Mr. Hardy had managed to squeeze through the election's with a scant majority.

The returns are yet incomplete and the result in a number of the divisions is in doubt and the conservatives do not, by any means, admit defeat. In fact they are decidedly hopeful that later returns will give them a small majority.

Two ministers are beaten viz: Messrs. Gitsen, of Hamilton, and Dryden in South Ontario, both by big majorities.

Mr. Haycock (the Patron leader, is also among the slain; but it doesn't matter as he has no party left. The Patrons are annihilated—only one, Mr. Tucker, in West Wellington, being elected.

The Conservatives claim the defeat of O'Keefe in Ottawa.

DELUSIONS.

Men, young men especially, have a habit of leaving the farm, the neighborhood where they were reared, even the country of their birth, hoping to better their condition elsewhere. Sometimes they succeed in doing so, but in a majority of instances their failure is complete. Even if they succeed in gaining a competence it is often at the expense of health and happiness. Of the thousands who are making their way to the Yukon the proportion of failures will probably be very much greater, for it is believed that the reports from that region are all colored to suit the interests of the transportation companies and a few cities on the Pacific coast.

Wherever a man is, the truest wisdom is to balance the good with the ill, to calmly weigh the advantages and disadvantages in such a question as breaking home ties, changing one's habitation, or hazarding a new venture. To be happily situated, among friends, enjoying the comforts of social life, earning a fair and honest livelihood, is far preferable to risking the doubtful good of increased riches at the cost of health and friends. It is not unlikely that in two years the trails through the Yukon region will be bordered with graves of ambitions and sturdy young men who dreamed that, by the acquisition of sudden wealth, they would secure a life-long lease of happiness for themselves and all who were near and dear to them. In a world full of delusions there was never a deeper delusion than this. The millionaire looks no farther into the sky, no farther across the sea than his valet, and the sleep of the one is no more refreshing than that of the other. He is the true philosopher who works his way through this life, "content with what the gods bestow," feeling that it is better to be the victim of wrong than its perpetrator, that it is better to be good than great, at last falling into his long sleep "like one who wraps the drapery of his couch about him and lies down to pleasant dreams."

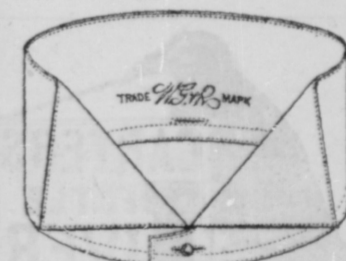
