5th Queens PC's Nominate Messrs Bell And Matheson

Progressive-Conservative electors of Second Queens last night chose R. R. Bell, Q.C. to contest the riding's Councillor seat in the next provincial general election.

Undeclared at the polls, he has represented Second Queens in the local House continuously since 1941, and is at present party house leader in the legislature.

Mr. Matheson, who represented the district in the local house on two prior occasions, won the Assemblyman nomination in a close race with New Haven produce dealer, Lloyd G. MacPhail.

When balloting was completed Mr. MacPhail moved that Mr. Matheson's nomination be unanimous.

Old Boundary Dispute Ends

TRURO (CP) — Cumberland County in northern Nova Scotia has won a 118-year-old boundary dispute with Colchester County that one solicitor said "was foolish to start with."

The decision of a provincial royal commission inquiry setup three years ago was announced at the Colchester Municipal Council's annual meeting here.

The commission established a new boundary line about 700 feet east of the old, disputed border. "I would suppose that both parties spent more money on this dispute than they'll get out of taxes in the next 50 years," said Cumberland solicitor A.R. Lusty.

He said it involved principally the interpretation on an 1840 statute defining the boundary on the Harrington River at Five Islands near Parrsboro. The dispute involved about 8,200 acres of mostly scrub land.
