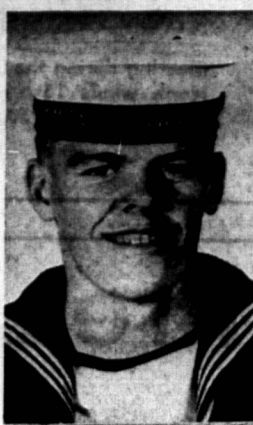

Potato Plebiscite Seeks Opinion On Marketing Bd.

On October 30 Prince Edward Island potato growers will go to the polls to decide matters relating to the marketing of their crop. At a plebiscite to be held on that date they will vote on the question, "Are You In Favour Of Retaining The Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board?"

The present board is composed of six producers and two dealers. William MacLennan of Sealestown is chairman and E. E. Campbell, Charlottetown is manager.

It is a Government appointed Board and is responsible to the Minister of Agriculture. When it was proclaimed in June 1956 one of the stipulations was that a plebiscite be held within 18 months of that date. This leaves December 28, 1957 as the deadline for calling the plebiscite.

Regular polling booths will be used as in any provincial election. Eligibility to vote means any person of 21 years of age who grows at least one acre of potatoes.

From enquiries made from various parts of the Province would appear that the coming plebiscite is arousing little interest among growers.

The present Board which operates on a budget of something over \$20,000 annually, is financed by a one-half cent levy per cwt. which the dealer pays to the Board.

The main functions of the present Board are to deal with

disease control and advertising and to supply authentic information to growers regarding current prices and crop estimates for the season.

It acts as the official agency in negotiating freight charges with the railways and during the past year has taken an active part in the negotiations regarding the American tariff agreements.

The Board presently has an agreement with the railway companies represented by the Canadian Freight Association which gives preferential rates to designated Canadian points in return for a guarantee that all potatoes where possible will be shipped by rail.

FIRST BOARD The first Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board was formed in August, 1950. At that time it took over the functions of the Potato Industry Promotional Committee which still exists.

The first plebiscite regarding the retention of the Potato Marketing Board was held in May 1954 at the request of the Board itself. The question then asked was: "Are you in favour of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board?" and resulted in a two to one vote in favour of the Board.

Later in the same year at the insistence of a number of those concerned with the industry and with the sanction of the Government it was felt that the question answered in the May plebiscite was not broad enough.

It was therefore decided to hold a second plebiscite in which two questions were asked: 1. "Are you in favour of having a potato marketing Board?" and 2. "Are you in favor of a compulsory one desk selling agency?"

It will be recalled that during the 1953-54 season a one-desk selling agency marketed the whole Island crop during which time they were successful in obtaining a guaranteed price agreement with the Federal Government.

POOL SYSTEM There were three pool periods and the prices agreed upon were 45 cents for the first period, 50 cents for the second period and 55 cents for the third period. These were minimum prices per bushel agreed upon by the Ottawa Government and it is estimated that the farmers of the Island were saved approximately \$2,000,000 in this deal.

On November 10, 1954 the growers again went to the polls and once again voted strongly in favour of a marketing board but voted 52-48 against the selling agency.

The Board continued in operation until 1955 when the Government appointed a new Board to replace the dealer-grower elected body. Finally the Marketing Act was changed in the Legislature during 1956 and when it was proclaimed in June of the same year the Board became directly responsible to the Minister of Agriculture.
