

Group Seeks Concerted Action On Potato Tariff

After general discussion on Wednesday evening, between Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., and the members of the executive and agricultural committee of the Summerside Board of Trade on the matter of U.S. and Canadian potato tariffs, Mr. John S. Wright, president of the Summerside Board of Trade was authorized to contact other boards of trade and the potato Marketing Board in an attempt to have a committee formed which

would have the responsibility of drawing up a resolution. This resolution would then be presented to each individual board for its consideration with the intention of eventually exerting as much pressure as possible on the government.

The potato growers and dealers object to the fact that American potatoes can come into this country duty free, except for a six weeks period in the summer while

Canadian potatoes entering the United States must pay a duty of 37½ cents a hundred weight until the quota is reached, then the duty doubles.

A full report of the meeting with Mr. MacNaught will be given at the regular meeting of the board tonight and the matter will be discussed. Mr. Wright will also report on the results of his efforts to contact the other boards of trade.

Expect Stanfield Will Take Over In N. S. Within Month

HALIFAX (CP) — Premier elect R. L. Stanfield is expected to meet with retiring premier Henry Hicks sometime today to decide when the Progressive Conservative party will officially take over the Nova Scotia government.

Mr. Hicks, whose two-year term as premier ended Tuesday in an upset general election that saw the Conservatives edge out the 23 year Liberal reign, motored here from Bridgton and said he would meet Mr. Stanfield at "his earliest convenience" to discuss the changeover. Mr. Stanfield, who came here from his mother's home in Truro, indicated the talks would be held as soon as possible. Both men will be at their Halifax homes today.

Meanwhile Mr. Hicks called a regular government meeting for next Tuesday, probably to discuss the forthcoming changeover. Four of his cabinet ministers went down to defeat Tuesday as the Conservatives captured 23 seats compared with 19 for the Liberals and one for the CCF.

It was believed the government reins would be handed to the 42-year-old Mr. Stanfield within the next month. In 1933 when Liberals, under the late Angus L. Macdonald put a Conservative government out of office, the official change took place 13 days after the election. In 1925 when sworn in 31 days after balloting.

The new leader, a lawyer, has so far refrained from mentioning possible cabinet posts, and observers here have come up with varied suggestions. It will likely be sometime before a new cabinet is completed.

Mr. Hicks said he will "do everything in my power" to help the new government, and he predicted that Nova Scotia's economy will continue to advance. He said the province is in an era of "substantial advancement" and he added that the election should not be too discouraging to Liberals. "We will come back," he said.

Mr. Stanfield will likely appoint his key men to the highways and trade and industry departments through which his main manifesto promises must pass. His platform included the establishment of an industrial development organization into which individuals and

Premier Flemming Pleased With Win

FREDERICTON (CP) — Premier Hugh John Flemming said Wednesday the mandate given the Nova Scotia Progressive Conservative party is "a clear and definite instruction to press for the rights of the Atlantic region."

Mr. Flemming, only other Conservative premier in the Atlantic provinces was returned to office in June at the head of his government with an increased majority.

"The Nova Scotia election," he said in a prepared statement, "cannot be regarded in any other way than as a political event of major importance, following as it does the decisive Conservative victory in New Brunswick."

The premier congratulated Mr. Stanfield on his defeat of the 23-year Liberal government Tuesday and said he will "look forward to working in close co-operation with him for the improvement of these provinces."

British Press Comment Varies On Military Action In Egypt

LONDON (AP) — British press reaction to the Anglo-French attack on Egypt ranged today from condemnation as "lunatic aggression" to praise for Prime Minister Eden's "courageous" move.

Here are some excerpts from the morning's editorials:

"News Chronicle (Liberal): 'There can be no further confidence in a man (Eden) who has brought his country to such a dangerous state of ignominy and confusion.'

"Daily Mail (Conservative): 'It may prove the government was mistaken in intervening in the Middle East with France, and at this juncture. But we can be sure that so grave a decision was reached only in the deep, sincere conviction that if we had remained quiescent Britain and the whole world would have suffered irreparable damage.'

"Daily Mirror (Labor): 'This is Eden's war. It can achieve nothing. It can settle nothing. It was the Israelis who invaded Egyptian territory on Monday. Yet it is the Egyptians who are being threatened by Britain and France today.'

"DEEPLY SHOCKED"
The Scotsman (Conservative): 'Sir Anthony Eden has taken a courageous but naturally unpopular course. If the initiative is to be left to those who undermine law and order, those who uphold international order will soon have nothing to uphold.'

Manchester Guardian (Liberal): 'Millions of British people are deeply shocked by the aggressive policy of the government. Its action in attacking Egypt is a disaster of the first magnitude. It is wrong on every count — moral, military and political.'

Daily Herald (Labor): 'One

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hope still remains of stopping Eden—the commonsense of the British people. The voice of the people must din in this government's ears the demand to call off this lunatic aggression."

Daily Sketch (Conservative): "So the fight is on... we shall be assailed by so-called reproaches, even from the United States. That is to be expected and that is to be borne."

Dundee Courier (Conservative): "There is no use trying to hide from the fact that the course we have adopted is fraught with serious risks."
