Sees Federal Education Aid Becoming More Imperative

OTTAWA (CP) — The need for some form of federal aid to education in Canada is becoming more imperative and more inescapable, an educationist-senator said Monday night in the Senate. Senator William M. Wall (L-Manitoba), who at 44 has been an educationist for 25 years, said education should be looked at in the context of an over-all national purpose. "It is from this point of view that we must examine carefully the need for some form of federal aid to education, which need is truly becoming more imperative and more inescapable."

It was brought to the attention of the meeting that July 20th would mark the 125th Anniversary of the Presbyterian Church in this area. Arrangements for special services to celebrate this event are to be made by the Session. Appreciation and thanks were extended to Rev. and Mrs. George Killen, the organist, assistant organist, choir, secretary-treasurer, Sunday School teachers, and all others who had contributed to the work of the church during the past year. Continued from page 1 In Washington. Both appeared in good health during the interview in Moscow's National Hotel. They were dressed in heavy Russian coats with fur collars and Russian felt hats. We had been summoned by a telephone call from Tass, the official Russian news agency, to be at the room. Tass refused to say what the purpose of the call was. Burgess and Maclean chatted freely with us and two Russian correspondents, but dodged every question put to them by us. The statement said Burgess had never made a secret of his sympathy with Russian policy or that he had previously been a Communist during the time he worked with the British Broadcasting Corporation, the British secret service or in the foreign office. "Throughout, he sympathized with Soviet policy and became increasingly alarmed by the post-war trend of Anglo-American policy. Most alarming of all was its failure first to reach and later even to seek to reach, a modus vivendi between East and West. "His attitude in these positions," it asserted, "was completely incompatible with the allegation that he was a Soviet agent."

FEDERAL PROJECTS

Mr. Kickham noted that in the parliamentary estimates Kings County received for harbours, wharves and dredging \$64,000. The largest item of this amount is an initial vote of three hundred thousand and for the reconstruction of the Government railway wharf and demolition of the frost-proof potato construction if its replacement on the same site. Tenders for this construction will be called when the final draft of plans and specifications are approved by the Chief Engineering Branch at Ottawa. The total cost of new construction and re-construction will be in the vicinity of one million dollars. Tenders have now been called for an extension of the Breakwater at Grahams Pond and also for harbour improvements at St. Peter's Harbour. There is also an initial vote of one hundred thousand dollars for the construction of a new Federal Public Building at Souris. The selection of an appropriate site for this building has not as yet been finalized. Mr. Kickham noted that Launching Pond and Basin Head harbours are presently suffering from the sand formation obstruction and he regretted that a request for a vote of funds to remedy those conditions at those two harbours was not approved for this current year; but they will have a high priority in next years allocation of moneys for Public Works.

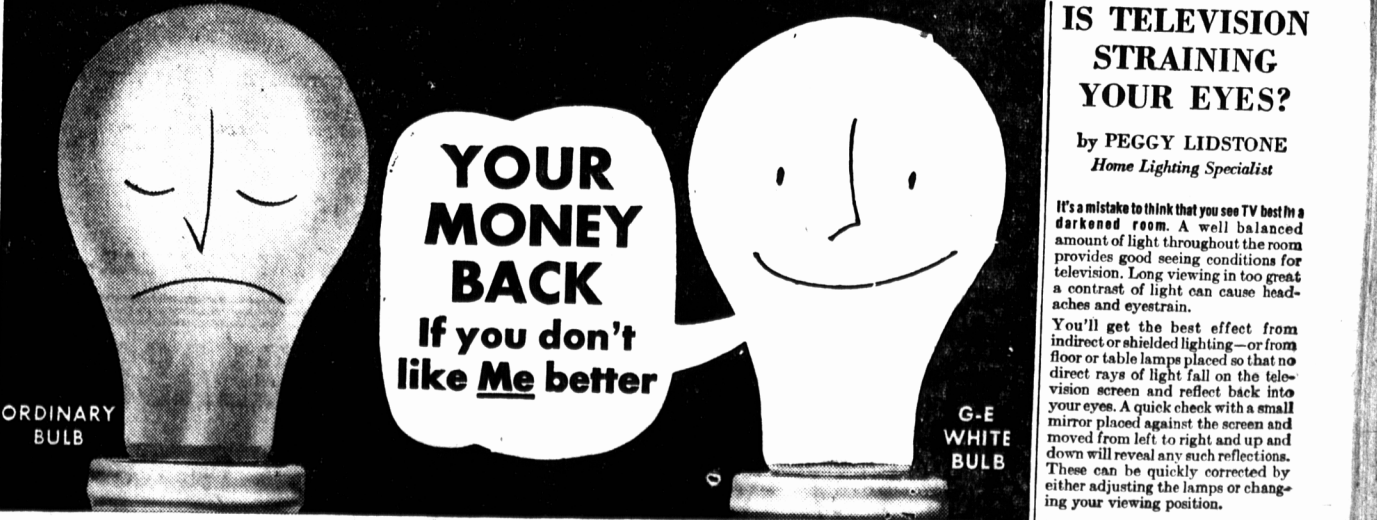
