Dickie, was also struck, and burned to ashes, together with the contents, including about sixteen tons of hay and four tons of straw.—Agriculture.

HAVE RESOURCES BUSINESS.—Advice from Australia as to the effect that the following banks which suspended payment and subsequently issued proposals for reconstruction have now resumed business, viz: The Commercial Bank of Australia, the National Bank of Australia, the City of Melbourne Bank, the Commercial Banking Company of Sydney, and the Australian Joint-Stock Bank. Three other banks are expected to resume payments in a few days.

Y. M. C. A.—The young men of the Maritime Provinces will have their summer school this year at Charlottetown, beginning on August 14th and lasting until the 20th. Instruction in practical Bible study and hints on how to manage a Young Men's Christian Association and lessons in gymnastics will be given during the session. Evangelist Meikle will have charge of the Bible study department, and M. Geo. H. Close, physical director of the Halifax Y. M. C. A., will have charge of the Physical department. Mr. A. W. McLeod, General Secretary of the St. John Y. M. C. A., will have charge of the Y. M. C. A. department.

THE TROTS.—A New Glasgow despatch says: A. C. Bell, owner of the celebrated trotting horses Israel and Dinah, has received a letter from his son giving an account of the races which took place at Monmouth, Illinois, July 4th and 5th, in which these horses took part. On the 4th Israel entered the 2.28 class and appeared as a winner. Indeed, he took the first heat with ease in 2.23 1/2, and then got so sick that he could only manage to get inside the flag. He got second money. It seems that the mineral water in that local-ity sickened him. It was with great difficulty that he was able to keep his feet; he sprained and tore his boots off. He trotted the day previous a trial heat in 2.19. Dinah trotted on the 5th inst., and won the race in straight heats, least two in three. Time, 2.24, 2.24, 2.24. Dinah was sick the day before the race also.

NO STORM.—The Guardian is informed that the inhabitants of Nine Mile Creek and vicinity were greatly alarmed on Thursday at 2 p. m., when a tremendous rain and wind storm burst over the country, flooding the land for a short time and causing the water to pour in torrents. The storm was about a mile wide, stretching from William Ross', West River, to Joe Currie's, Nine Mile Creek, and lasted about twenty minutes. It travelled in a southerly direction, bursting over St. Peter's Island. The water is said to have been three inches deep, and for a time the brook was flooded. The storm was of the nature of a cyclone, parts of fences being carried several feet in some places, whilst near at hand no damage was done. In the river a waterspout formed, the water being drawn from parts of the beach to the depth of about two feet. Altogether it is said to be the wildest storm ever seen in that part of the country.

CANADA'S ACCOUNTS.

The Revenue and Expenditure.

A Most Satisfactory Showing.

OTTAWA, July 15.

The Finance Department has issued an interim statement of receipts and expenditure for the past fiscal year. The revenue was \$37,183,000, the expenditure was \$39,652,000. The present figures, however, only represent receipts and payments which have passed through the books of the department up to the 30th of June and is no criterion of the state of the finances for the fiscal year, which cannot be ascertained until all returns are received from various parts of the Dominion. When the final statement is issued it is expected to show a revenue of \$38,000,000 and an expenditure of \$36,500,000, leaving a net surplus of \$1,500,000, a tidy little nest egg, as the result of Government economy.

ARTILLERY COMPETITIONS.

The Dominion Men Preparing for the Event.

MONTRÉAL, July 15.

The Garrison Artillery are hard at work preparing for the Dominion artillery competition in Halifax during the week of August 8th. A canvass of corps has been made in order to obtain the names of those who could take part in the competition, the result being that one hundred men are on the list available. These muster at the drill shed two evenings a week. They are being carefully drilled, and from them a team of sixty men will be selected.

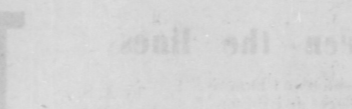

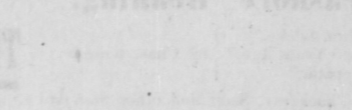
