

News Notes.

Since the election of President Harrison, thirteen thousand fourth-class postmasters have been put out of office.

A large number of Ontario medical men left for Banff to-day to take part in the annual meeting of the Dominion Medical Society.

The New York World states that the Standard Oil Company has bought up all the white lead companies in the United States.

Common scolding is a costly indulgence in New Jersey. Mrs. Brady, of Jersey City, had to pay \$75 recently for her shrewish habits.

The Times says that the population of Moncton is now probably in excess of 8,000. The new buildings erected average about 100 each year.

A despatch from Paris says that in the harvesting department of the Paris exhibition, Massey & Co. of Toronto take the highest prize for binders.

Eighty thousand Turkish reserves have been called out. The Porte is buying uniforms and stores, and work is proceeding at the dock yards with feverish activity.

Emancipation day was celebrated by the colored people of Canada. Large demonstrations were held at Toronto and at Whitby, Sandwich, Chatham and Owen Sound.

A Constantinople correspondent says that the French Minister has given assurance to Greece that France will favor the settlement of the Cretan difficulty so as to benefit Greece.

The bark Zenobia, which arrived at Parrsboro, N. S., on Sunday, was struck by lightning in the Gulf Stream, carrying away the top of her topgallantmast and striking the vessel in two places and doing serious damage.

The life of a man-of-war is but short, if the Repulse is a fair example. She has been afloat twenty years, and, having cost \$247,000, she has been sold to a firm of shipbreakers for £7,000. She was really in commission only eleven years and a quarter.

The population of the State of Nevada has declined 30 per cent. in ten years, and is less to-day than twenty years ago. The failure of the silver mines has caused the trouble. The St. John Telegraph commenting, says: No province of the Dominion is to-day so poor, so retrogressive, or with so blank a future before it as this once promising state of the great American union.

Chief Bushiri has sent a threatening message to the inhabitants of Bagamoyo and that neighborhood forbidding them to supply the Germans with provisions. He announces his intention to attack Bagamoyo. Fever is prevalent and among the fleet the British are apparently suffering the most. On the Agemmenon alone eighty are sick, including seven officers, out of a total complement of four hundred.

And now they are experimenting with Dr. Brown-Sequard's elixir of life in Washington. Dr. W. A. Hammond, of that city, professes to have tried it with good results, such as restoring a paralyzed arm, etc. He makes the elixir from various glands of a newly slaughtered lamb. It is, when ready for use, "a fluid scarcely thicker than water, pure and limpid." It is applied by hypodermic injection in the arm.

Mr. Thomas Sexton, Lord Mayor of Dublin, has written to the United States legation with reference to the letter received by him from President Harrison. He asserts that the letter had been wilfully opened and defaced before it reached his hands. The seal, he says, had been melted and gum was scratched over the outside of the envelope. The gum used by the person who opened the letter, and the gum originally on the envelope, were palpably different.

British cotton mills have had so prosperous a year that already seven new mills, to contain 650,000 spindles, are being built. The total British exports of cotton cloth for the past six months were 50,000,000 yards more than for the like period last year, and this, notwithstanding the amount exported to China and Hong Kong has decreased. The protected cotton manufacturers are not more prosperous than those of Britain and quite unable to compete with them in the outside markets of the world.
