Cleveland Wins A L Pennant; End Domination By Yankees

DETROIT (AP)—Cleveland Indians ended three long years of bitter second-place frustrations Saturday when they clinched the American League championship with their 107th victory, a 3-2 decision over Detroit Tigers.

The Indians, in winning their third pennant in 54 years, brought to a decisive end the five-year rule of New York Yankees.
