of potatoes is set by the "ancient law of supply and demand" and noted flatly that the Board "knows nothing of either economics or potatoes and this is just another familiar case of the tail trying to wag the dog."

At a meeting as bitter in his objection to the bill was Mr. William Hughes, Fifth King's, who stated that it would permit one group to collect taxes from another. He said the Federation of Agriculture cannot claim to represent all the farmers of this Province and objected to the amendment being placed on the desks of members of the Legislature only 10 minutes previously instead of the customary 24 hours.

He also stated that many dealers in potatoes had a complete understanding of the problems of the farmers who were growing them, "sometimes a better one than the farmer himself."

Hon. Donald MacKinnon said the legislation was asked for by the farmers "and we should give it to them." "We have as much right to do this," he added, "as to legislate all the youngsters coming out of college into a union."

Mr. George Kilson, Second Queen's, joined with others in taking exception to the proposed powers and he, too, asked how many farmers belong to the Federation which was asking for the Marketing Board. He said the Board had illegally collected money from him as a dealer and then was asking him to buy a license when it had not repaid what had already been taken.

Mr. Douglas, in defending the bill, said the farmers had to buy everything they needed at retail but were forced to sell their produce at wholesale. He said it was time they got control of their own work.

He told the members that the proposed marketing changes were being brought in because the recent decision of the Supreme Court of Canada would seem to make it expedient that any doubts regarding the Marketing Act, in relation to a workable means of financing it, should be eliminated. Previous methods had been ruled invalid.

Reading from a memorandum on the subject Mr. Douglas stated that the decision might have been different if more general revenue authority had been provided in the Provincial Marketing Act. Because of this lack of direct licensing of producers has been attempted in the present year. However, he noted

that such procedure is difficult from an administration standpoint, "especially when prominent persons in the potato trade have been open to advising producers that they need not obtain a license."

Premier Jones said it had been impossible to collect license fees in the old way and stated that most of the speakers on the subject were parties particularly interested. He did not believe that people engaged in the marketing of potatoes should use their legislative position to advance their own interests.

Mr. Douglas mentioned the largely attended meeting of farmers at Prince of Wales College and said after that there could be little doubt of what the farmers wanted. He said he would like to hear from some farmers instead of just dealers and merchants.

Mr. George Saville, Fifth King's, said he attended the meeting mentioned and voted for the resolution passed there because he could see no other way to obtain the necessary funds to control ring rot. However, he wondered how many of those present at the meeting and voting for the resolution had afterwards reached into their pockets and paid the license fee.

The speaker believed a great deal of trouble arose because farmers were laboring under a misunderstanding that when it was set up the Marketing Board was going to take over the marketing of Island potatoes. He did not think any board was much good in the fall as then we have a "natural market" in the Southern States.

He thought the dealers had absorbed the loss involved this season in buying when prices were high and holding until the spring and another year like it would force the Board to take over as the dealers would be out of business.

Mr. W.F.A. Stewart, First Queens, said that this simply meant that we were making the potato dealers collect the licenses.

Mr. R.R. Bell said he favored the amendment if it would aid the farmers in the marketing of their potatoes. But he believed that the bill should be held over until this morning to give members an opportunity to study it. He was opposed to passing any legislation in the dying moments of the House without proper consideration being given to the acts.

The bill was left in committee for further consideration today. The Legislature yesterday resumed discussion of the estimates late in the afternoon after a long discussion on the Marketing Act and quickly disposed of those dealing with agriculture, education, Industry and Natural Resources and the Administration of Justice. In each case the minister was in the chair with Premier Jones taking over for Mr. C.C. Baker, Minister

Revised Building Code Expected

OTTAWA, (CP)—The building research division of the national research council is expected to issue a new building code in the next few months, it was learned Wednesday.

A revision of the code, an advisory document which municipalities may adopt as their minimum building requirements, now is being prepared by about 200 architects, engineers, building inspectors and union representatives working through 29 committees.

The revision is the first since 1941 and embodies fire, health and structural safety measures. About 140 Canadian municipalities have adopted the code as their building requirements.

Observe 35th Birthday of Royal Air Force

MANCHESTER, England, (CP)—Twenty-four Sabre jets from the R.C.A.F.'s No. 1 fighter wing at North Luffenham joined Wednesday in a fly-past over Manchester marking the 35th birthday anniversary of the R.A.F.

The Canadian group, forming part of a total of more than 100 planes, was led by Wing Cmdr. Doug Lindsay of Amnorpur, Ont. Field Marshal Earl Alexander, Britain's defence minister and former governor-general of Canada, watched the fly-past and inspected a ceremony on the ground, in which the Queen's color of the R.A.F. was paraded for the first time in any provincial city.

tourist industry. Minister of Industry and Natural Resources stated that a continuous road from Cavendish to Dalry was absolutely necessary.
