## Eagle Given His Trophy

**AT SDU FIELD SATURDAY**

Then with only two minutes remaining in the game, quarter-back Ross threw a labeled pass to W. Kirk but the play was called back because of an offensive holding infraction by UNB line-man B. Gilmore. Kirk had made it to the one yard line but the Saints automatically took possession because of the holding penalty.

Temperers got hot by times in the second half and on one play both Ripley of the Saints and Dew of the Bombers were thrown out for fighting. This caused some difficulty for coach Hilton. Wes Macleiser 'ad been playing at the halfback position but was required to move to quarter as John Friscoil was not dressed for the game. Wes did an admirable job under the circumstances though as UNB failed to make any headway.

Statistically speaking, there was little difference between the two teams. UNB outnished the Saints 22-218 yards and made good 68 yards to the Saints in the passing department. Dave Morton, who was shaken up several times during the game, averaged 35.9 yards on the punts while Mike Ward averaged 44. In punt returning, the Saints averaged 25 yards in 8 carries; UNB had thirty one in six carries.

For the Saints, Fred Ripley was the outstanding player of the game. Playing both on offense and defense, Ripley got the Saints the first touchdown and made several key tackles. He repeatedly made great

blocks for the St. Dunstan's back fielders. Vince Mulligan also played outstanding ball as he was instrumental in the second touchdown and was the best defensive backfielder in the game.

Latest word on J. Didman of UNP who was shaken up in the first quarter is that his leg is not broken. Didman was involved in a pileup and wrenched his knee. The doctor in attendance had him hospitalized for treatment but his condition is not serious.

The Saints next game is here next Saturday when they host Mount Allison University. Mount beat UNB 30-0 earlier this season, but it is reported that the score was not indicative of the play.

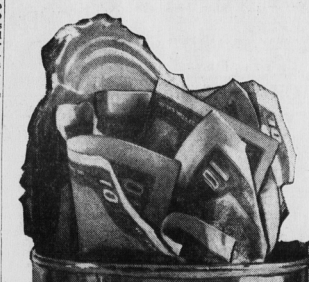

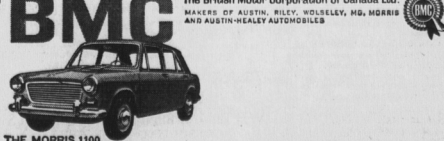
