Ilsa Konrads Sets Two New World Marks

SYDNEY, Australia (AP)—Ilsa Konrads, Australia's amazing 14-year-old swimming champion, added the 1,500-metre and 1,650-yard world records Wednesday to her fast-growing collection.

The Latvian-born swimmer was timed in 19:25.7 for both 1,500 metres (1,640 yards, one foot, four inches) and 1,650 yards. The latter distance represents 30 laps in the 55-yard Olympic pool.

A crowd of 2,500 cheered her on in an unpaced race against the clock. She clipped 37.4 seconds off the 1,500-metre record of 20:03.1, set by Jans Koster of The Netherlands, and cracked the world standard of 20:30 for 1,650 yards by a whopping 64.3 seconds. No individual held the 1,650-yard mark. The time was set up by the International Amateur Swimming Federation when it ruled world records could only be made in 50-metre and 55-yard pools.

If a player is minus an eye some night, everybody, including the culprit who did the damage, is going to feel very sorry about the whole thing. Sympathy will be extended from all sides but none of it will be much compensation for that missing organ of sight.

These hockey sticks were intended for use on the ice. They are not pennants that are supposed to be waved around opponent's heads. If those fellows who persist in this high sticking would try to determine what the true use of hockey sticks is, then we are sure they'd arrive at the right conclusion.

How about it, boys: PARKDALE ROYALS are a worried lot these days and their able defenceman, John Bellavance, is the cause of the worry.

Bellavance is a valued employee with a construction company here (they are doing the P.E.I. Hospital job) and his bosses are a bit worried about him receiving an injury. Last season John was sidelined for quite some time and his employers are not sure the same thing won't happen again. When this column was written, it was very doubtful if Bellavance would be in the lineup when Navy and Royals clash tonight. However, the Royals' management still have hopes of hanging on to their ace rear-guard and we hope they are successful. Chaps like Bellavance are certainly an asset to any league.

In the short time he played here, he has proved decidedly popular with players and fans alike. From all sides, we have heard nothing but praise for the work of Bellavance. We sincerely hope he can finish out the season.

Rangers Nip Leafs 3-2

TORONTO (CP)—New York Rangers stretched their undefeated streak to three games and locked Toronto Maple Leafs in the National Hockey League cellar with a 3-2 victory in a hard-fought game Wednesday night.

The game was a crucial one for Leafs—a win would have moved them out of the NHL basement where they have languished nearly all season. The victory moves Rangers to within a point of second-place Chicago Black Hawks.

GAINS GROUND

Andy Bathgate, earlier this week voted all-star right-winger at the halfway mark of the NHL season, led the winners with a goal, his 24th, and an assist. The two points gave him 50, including 25 assists, and left him one point behind the leading Bernie Geoffrion of Montreal Canadiens.

Defenceman Harry Howell and left-winger Camille Henry scored the other New York goals. Left-winger Dick Duff and centre Bob Pulford were the Toronto scorers.

Leafs, except for the odd rash of rushes down the ice, were no match for the flying New Yorkers.

Toronto netminder Ed Chadwick was left alone several times to handle shots which the Rangers fired at him in bunches. Altogether, he kicked out 35 of the 36 shots fired his way, 16 in the first period.
