

MacDonald Rink Wins 1, Loses 1 In Finals Play

MONCTON (CP)—Manitoba and Ontario alone emerged undefeated Monday night after the second round of the Canadian curling championships—and both by unexpectedly healthy margins.

Bill Walsh's Winnipeg rink won its first round match against Quebec 12-7 and breezed past Northern Ontario 9-7 in the evening second round.

Ontario, skipped by Alphonse Phillips, dusted off favored Alberta 9-4 in a surprising first-round finish and won 12-8 in the evening against another pre-tournament choice, the defending champion Saskatchewan squad.

Newfoundland has yet to win a match but the other three Atlantic provinces—New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia—completed the day with 1-1 records.

New Brunswick and Ontario, a couple of underdogs, crossed up the experts in the first round by trimming Saskatchewan and Alberta.

New Brunswick did the job on Saskatchewan 13-10 and Ontario came up with a 9-4 win over Alberta.

Manitoba performed as expected defeating Quebec 12-7, and British Columbia defeated Newfoundland 12-9.

Prince Edward Island defeated Nova Scotia 16-12 in a match that was a toss-up from the outset.

The Saskatchewan-New Brunswick match corralled the crowd's attention; Delisle's Jimmy Hill and home-towner Ralph Lister had

their rinks curling to perfection. It was tough and so all the way with the score deadlocked 3-3 after three ends, 6-6 after six, and 9-9 after nine. Saskatchewan edged ahead with a score on the 10th end but Lister was not to be denied. He pushed home a two in the 11th and added another in the 12th when Hill was unable to break up a cluster of New Brunswick stones around the button. Still only one was good.

PHILLIPS IS STAR
Alphonse Phillips played his Ontario rink with the skill of a fencing master and had them hitting on his broom in an amazing display of knockout curling.

The Ontario four scored singles in eight ends, seven consecutive, as they took the game right away from Alberta. Matt Baldwin's rink were leading 3-1 after three ends but they didn't get another show-in until the 12th when they added a single.

Dr. Wendell MacDonald skipped his Prince Edward Island rink to a win over Nova Scotia after almost blowing the match at the midway point. The Islanders were holding a comfortable 9-3 lead after six ends.

Goins finally got his rink rolling in the seventh when he struck for four. P.E.I. scored one in the eighth but Goins came right back to tie the score 10-10 with a three on the ninth. But the MacDonald rink scored three in the 10th and put the game away with three more in the final end. Nova Scotia had a two on the 11th.

British Columbia and Newfoundland were battling on fairly even terms with the Kimberley rink leading 5-4 after six.

The western team scored seven in the next two ends and Newfoundland never recovered. Bob Goudey did rally his mates for a three on the 10th but the 11th end was dead and all Newfoundland could get in the final end was a single.

The Manitoba-Quebec match after starting out with a dead end failed to hold the interest of the fans much past the mid-way point when Bill Walsh had his rink ahead 6-2.

The Winnipeg four captured all but five ends and maintained a comfortable margin throughout. Only once did Walter Smith of Theford mines threaten and that was a three in the 11th but it was too late.

Trotters, Aces Win Hoop Tilts

The Trotters resumed their winning ways in the City Basketball League last night whipping the Aces 86-54 in the first game of a doubleheader at P. W. C. In the second contest the second place Aces kept pace with a 79-64 verdict over the Welshmen.

After The Playoffs It Is Trophy Time In The N.H.L.

In less than two weeks the National Hockey League will be getting ready for its Stanley Cup Playoffs. The Canadians of course will be the top place team and will also be top heavy favorites to take everything in sight. If they don't there just isn't any justice on Saturday night the Habs whipped the Chicago Hawks 3-1, which isn't any great feat, but their victory over the Wings on Sunday should be regarded as something of a surprise since the Canucks must have been at least a little below par for that game.

After playing in Chicago on Friday, travelling back to Montreal on Saturday and off to Detroit on the same night, Toe Blake's crew must have been a very tired outfit when they arrived at the Olympia. Yet they had enough on the ball to come from behind and score 6 goals on Glen Hall, which in itself is something that hasn't been done too often this year.

Jean Beliveau picked up two more goals over the weekend to run his total to 44. He now needs 6 to tie or 7 to break Richard's record, and he has 6 games left to do it. Another record that could easily fall is that for assists held by Ted Lindsay. Bert Olmstead needs 5 assists to crack it. Elmer Lach's total of 54 was high before Lindsay broke it. Still another mark that could get severely jarred is that of most points by a team in one season held by the Red Wings. Canadians have an outside chance of doing it but they need five victories in the remaining games to gain 102 points for the season, to break, by one point, the old mark.

Soon after the playoffs the yearly all-star teams will be picked and a number of trophies carrying a \$1,000 price tag will be passed around. We may as well get in the swing of things and pass around a couple ourselves. Probably the most important or at least the trophy with the most meaning attached to it is the Hart, given annually to the player judged the most valuable to his team. Out of a large field that includes such notables as Andy Bathgate, Jean Beliveau,

The "Rocket", Doug Harvey, Ted Sloan, Gord Howie, Kelly Kelly, Celsa and Gordie Howe, Beliveau looms as a great favorite at least this corner's great favorite. We would vote a special award known as the "Heart Trophy" for fearless Al Rollins for great courage shown above and beyond the call of duty.

For the Calder Trophy there are some good looking young prospects Celsa and Lalonde have trailed off quite a bit following an early season rush. Henri Richard started out well; slid back a bit after his injury and has been doing a good bit better in these last few days of the season. Dick Duff has been consistently good all year and Glen Hall once again proved that Jack Adams knows a prospect when he sees one. Yet in the face of all of this competition this corner casts its vote for young Andy Heberton whose play with the Rangers has been nothing short of outstanding.

The Lady Byng award is one that a lot of players would be ashamed of receiving. Defensemen seldom win it although Red Kelly and Bill Quackenbush have seen a couple of notable exceptions. Neither one of these has much chance of taking it this year. Kelly is well up in the penalty parade and Quackenbush's star has dimmed quite a bit since he was a standout for Detroit and in his first few years with the Bruins. When there is no outstanding defenseman around with a low penalty record it is usually given to a high scorer who has only a nodding acquaintance with the league's various penalty time-keepers. Dutch Rebel will win it on that basis.

Jacques Plante has all but clinched the Vezina Trophy which in reality is a team award, but the Vezina Trophy winner isn't always regarded as being the best goaltender in the league. So as all-star goalie this corner casts its vote for little Gump Worsley who will be given more than passing notice for the Hart Trophy. The rest of our all-star squad would go like this: defense Kelly and Harvey; forwards Beliveau, Howe and Olmstead.
