

# Wings Break Slump; Shut Out Boston 6-0

DETROIT (AP) — Detroit Red Wings shook up their lines and put Hank Bassen in as goalie Sunday night and the moves paid off with a slumping 6-0 victory over Boston Bruins.

The new first line, with Claude Laforge joining Alex Delvecchio and Gordie Howe, turned in three of the tallies, each player scoring once.

Norm Ullman scored twice for Detroit in a minute and a half span in the third period.

And rookie Chuck Holmes, who joined Detroit last week, scored his first National Hockey League goal as the Wings rushed to a 4-0 lead in two periods. The victory ended Detroit's three-game losing streak and was the Wings' first win in six games. Last-place Boston's losing streak was increased to five.

**IN PLAYOFFS**

By winning, Detroit remained one point behind New York in the race for fourth place and the final Stanley Cup playoff position. The Rangers beat Montreal 2-1 Sunday night.

Bassen took over at goal for Terry Sawchuk after the pregame warmup. Sawchuk's hand had been painful and he had allowed 15 goals in his last two games.

Bassen, who had been used sparingly for several seasons,

# Rangers Shade Habs 2-1 Before Turnaway Crowd

NEW YORK (AP) — New York Rangers, with emergency goalie Marcel Paille in the nets, Sunday night snapped Montreal Canadiens' 12-game unbeaten string with a 2-1 victory for their first triumph over the National Hockey League leaders this season.

Paille, recalled from Springfield of the American Hockey League, was superb in the nets, especially in the final period when he made 17 of his 40 saves. Regular goalie Lorne (Gump) Worsley suffered a bruised right elbow in the Rangers' 4-1 loss at Toronto Saturday night.

The Canadiens hadn't lost since the Maple Leafs beat them 3-1 Jan. 3. Since then, they had won 10 and tied twice before Sunday night. The loss also broke their five-game winning streak while New York captured its third victory in the last four starts after a 10-game losing skid.

All three goals were bunched in the second period. Rookie Dave Balon produced the first goal at 4:47 and defencemen Al Langlois, who had been sidelined with a charleyhorse, made it 2-0 for New York on a power play at 6:40. Dickie Moore's backhand at 17:11 prevented a shutout.

**SECOND THIS SEASON**

Balon tallied his second goal of the season, drilling the puck past Montreal goalie Jacques Plante from close range.

Langlois, a former Canadiens' player who didn't decide until just before game time to play, scored a 40-footer with Lou Fontaine, an ex-Ranger, in the penalty box. It was his fifth of the season.

Henri Richard's pass set up Moore with his 11th, a 15-footer that the 29-year-old Paille had no chance to block.

In nine previous games between the teams this season, the Canadiens had won five and four had ended in ties. This also marked the first time that New York had beaten Montreal.

while Plante was in the goal, in 18 games.

The Rangers' last victory over Plante came in the last game of the 1959-60 season. Montreal had used goalie Charlie Hodge several times in the nets against the New Yorkers.

A turnaway crowd of 15,929 in Madison Square Garden saw Rangers coach Doug Harvey win his first game over his former teammates.

**PLENTY OF ACTION**

Although the first and third periods were scoreless, there was plenty of action in both of them. Referee Frank Udvari handed out seven penalties in the opening period. The Rangers were short-handed twice in the final period as the Canadiens vainly tried to gain the equalizer.

Montreal dominated the action in the third period as Plante handled only five shots. He wound up with 26 saves.

Andy Bathgate of the Rangers, the league's leading scorer, collected one assist to increase his scoring total to 63 points. He has 19 goals and 43 assists.

Balon converted passes from Pat Hannigan and Irv Spencer on his goal, while Bathgate and Dean Prentice collaborated on Langlois' power play slapshot.

The Rangers remained in fourth place, only a point ahead of the Detroit Red Wings, who beat the Boston Bruins 6-0 Sunday night.

HALIFAX (CP) — Free-wheeling right winger Pickles McNichol fired an early third-period goal to give a New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island team a 10-9 victory over Nova Scotia and the first annual Maritime oldtimers series title Saturday night.

McNichol's marker, his second within nine seconds, gave the N.B.-P.E.I. squad a 10-18 two-game, total-goal edge for the series. Jackie Keating, N.B.-P.E.I. coach and team captain, accepted the winning trophy.

More than 3,500 fans cheered themselves hoarse as the former Maritime hockey stars skirmished over the ice.

N.B.-P.E.I. held an edge in each period, with Nova Scotia's Charlie Copus firing the last marker at 13:30 of the final frame. Nova Scotia emptied its net at the final minute and poured its six-man pressure on goalie McDonald.

Former NHL player Gordie Drillon matched McNichol's output with two goals for N.B.-P.E.I., which also collected singles off the sticks of Walt Butler, Don Garay, Abbie Coldwell, Steve Estabrooks, Nick Nicolle and Moustie Dowling.

Pud Stanhope and Rock Sullivan clicked for two goals each for Nova Scotia, with Muckle Hollett, Billy Hannon, Bruce Gallagher and Copus scoring one each.

McDonald stopped 16 and Giggsy 15 in the N.B.-P.E.I. net, while Mumford cleared 13 and Yeadon 19 in the Nova Scotia net. There were no penalties.

# Battle Royal Erupts In EPHL Game Sun.

HULL, Que. (CP) — A battle royal erupted on the ice at the Hull Arena Sunday as Hull-Ottawa Canadiens of the Eastern Professional Hockey League routed Sudbury Wolves 7-1 before 2,694 fans.

It all started when Habs' playing coach Bob Armstrong and Wolves' goalie Carl Wetzel collided in front of the Sudbury nets, backed off, threw down their sticks and gloves, and exchanged punches.

When Sudbury defenceman Jack Hendrickson came to Wetzel's aid, goalie Cesare Maniacio flashed down from the Hull-Ottawa nets and joined the battle.

The entire Sudbury bench swarmed onto the ice, with six or seven players heading for Armstrong and the rest going after members of the Hull-Ottawa team.

The fight broke out early in the second period.

When order finally had been restored, officials handed out majors to the four original combatants. It is expected fines will be levied by the league board of directors against players involved.

EPHL rules state that in case of a general melee fines may be assessed.

Rookie defenceman Barclay Pledger led the Canadiens to their win with three goals. Fred Hiltz got two and Bill Masterton and John Rodger mastered singles. Ted Wright scored Sudbury's lone goal early in the first period.

Referee Bruce Sims handed out 17 penalties, 11 of them, including a misconduct, going to Sudbury.

# Canadiens Romp To 8-1 Decision

MONTREAL (CP) — The slugging Montreal Canadiens struck for three quick goals early in the first period and went on to smash Detroit Red Wings 8-1 in a rough National Hockey League game Saturday night.

With the easy win, the Canadiens stretched an unbeaten streak to 12 games—10 wins and two ties—and stayed six points ahead of Toronto Maple Leafs in the race for the league championship.

Their early outburst came within one minute and 29 seconds.

Gilles Tremblay started it at 6:23 with his 22nd goal of the season and by 7:52, Dickie Moore and Claude Provost also had scored.

Provost got another goal in the third period. They were his 28th and 29th of the season.

Ralph Backstrom and Bobby Rousseau added goals in the second period while Don Marshall and Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion also scored in the third.

**SPOILS SHUTOUT**

Claude Laforge spoiled goalie Jacques Plante's bid for his fourth shutout of the season with Detroit's lone tally at 14:19 of the second. It came off a power play.

It was a rough night for Gordie Howe, the indefatigable Detroit right winger who is seeking a sixth NHL scoring title.

Besides going pointless, Howe drew the ire of a Montreal crowd of 14,397 early in the second period and was booed incessantly the rest of the way.

Howe's troubles started after he held Henri Richard, going in for a shot on goal, then accidentally fell on top of him.

Richard had to be carried off the ice and sat out the rest of the game. He needed two stitches to close a cut on his forehead and was reported to be suffering dizzy spells.

**GETS PENALTY**

As a result of the incident, Howe drew a two-minute holding penalty, one of 20 infractions dished out by referee Eddie Powers. One was a 10-minute misconduct to Detroit defenceman Warren Geoffrion for squawking in the first minute of the second period.

Canadiens, in one of their best displays of the season, rifled 41 shots at Detroit goalie Terry Sawchuk. Plante was almost as busy, handling 40 drives, but many of these were easy ones.

Detroit was one man short when Gilles Tremblay got Canadiens a 1-0 lead with a low 30-foot shot that went in off the skates of Wings defenceman Marshall Provost.

Moore got his 10th goal at

7:33, deflecting Provost's corner pass under a falling Sawchuk. On the next rush, Sawchuk came out of his net to stop Richard, but the Pocket Rocket swung around him and shot at the net. Provost stopped the puck just at the goal, but it bounced to Provost who promptly banged it in the open net.

Backstrom scored on his own rebound at 11:58 of the second and less than two minutes later, Rousseau got a pretty goal for 4-0 Montreal lead.

**SHOOT'S 20-FOOTER**

Montreal's Billy Hicke was serving a holding penalty when Marshall and Rousseau broke away with only Alex Delvecchio back for the Wings. Marshall passed to Rousseau inside the Detroit blue line and the rookie right winger sent a 20-foot blast to Sawchuk's far side.

The Wings got their only goal just as Hicke was set to return to the ice. Plante was down after making a save and Laforge only had to lift a loose-puck over him.

Marshall, standing at the edge of the crease, took Backstrom's pass from behind the net and beat Sawchuk at 3:24 of the third for a 6-1 lead.

Provost got his second goal at 11:07 on defenceman Jean-Guy Talbot's rebound and Geoffrion closed the scoring at 15:10 with a 25-foot blast at Sawchuk's stick side.

AMHERST (CP) — Galt Terriers, Canadian contenders for the World Amateur Ice Hockey Championship, wound up a three-game Maritime tour Saturday with a 7-0 win over league-leading Amherst Ramblers of the Nova Scotia Senior Hockey League.

The Senior Ontario Hockey Association representatives made their best showing of the tour Saturday before 3,040, the biggest crowd ever to jam the two-year-old Amherst Stadium. The Terriers easily whipped Halifax Wolverines 8-1 Thursday and managed to edge Moncton Beavers 7-6 Friday.

CHICAGO (AP) — Third period goals by Chico Maki and Pierre Pilote broke up a tight, tense National Hockey League game here Sunday night and gave Chicago Black Hawks a 2-1 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs.

The triumph cut the second place Leafs edge over the Black Hawks to eight points. By losing the Leafs remained six points back of the league-leading Montreal Canadiens, who were beaten by the New York Rangers Sunday night.

Maki's marker came at 4:44 of the third period with Toronto's Bob Pulford in the penalty box. The tally was the rookie wing's fourth in the National Hockey League.

Chicago was short-handed at 13:48 when Pilote, a defenceman, intercepted a pass by Red Kelly in Toronto ice and broke in along on Leaf goalie Johnny Bower.

**NO SHUTOUT**

Frank Mahovlich wreaked Chicago goalie Glenn Hall's bid for his seventh shutout of the season at 18:15 of the third period when he knocked in his 27th goal of the year.

The Leafs pulled Bower in favor of a sixth skater with 45 seconds to go and with 25 seconds left Pilote was sent off for interference. However, the Hawks managed to hang on for their fifth consecutive victory, despite the fact that the Leafs managed to keep the puck in Chicago ice for most of the final minute.

Referee John Ashley was kept as busy as the players during the rough contest. He called a total of 16 penalties, including majors for fighting to Chicago's Elmer Vaska and Tim Horton
