Coal-Laden.—Five schooners arrived today from Pictou and Sydney with coal for C. Lyons & Co.

Masonic.—A regular convocation of Alexandria, R. A., Chapter, No. 4, R. N. S., will be held at lodge rooms, Masonic Temple, this (Thursday) evening, Nov. 1st, at 8 o'clock, for transaction of general business.

Interesting Relics.—The pistols that were in the possession of General Wolfe at the storming of Quebec, and presented by him in his last moments to Lieut. Holland of the 49th Regiment, have been photographed by Mr. Charles Hill, photographer, Queen Street, and will be on view in a few days.

Burglars Abroad.—Burglars are ransacking things in sections of Nova Scotia. The postoffice at West River, Sheet Harbor, was burglarized on Monday night, and the safe was broken open and the contents taken away. This makes the fifth postoffice robbed in the same way during the past three months, and at least forty stores have been burglarized.

Scott Act.—At Georgetown yesterday, before Stipendiary Magistrate Blanchard, Lemuel Clark, of Graham's Road, and Daniel J. McCormack, of Boughton Island, were convicted of first violations of the Canada Temperance Act and each was fined in the sum of \$50 and costs. The summonses against Charles Macdonald, Lower Montague, and John Currie, Little Sands, were dismissed.

Banquet at Montague Bridge.—The stockholders and patrons of the cheese factory at Montague Bridge gave a banquet a few days ago in honor of Mr. W. B. Brewer, the manager. The viands were plentifully provided and well served at the hospitable board of Mr. John J. McDonald were excellent, and the post prandial speeches enthusiastic. Altogether the affair was exceedingly pleasant and highly creditable to all concerned in it.

On the Slip.—The Halifax Herald says: The schooner Fortuna, built in 1888, 97 tons, that cleared a few days ago for P. E. Island, was recalled at Canso and arrived back in Halifax and went on the marine railway yesterday for examination, and probably to be coppered. The sale of the vessel to Thomas Moran and others is about completed. The intention is to fit the schooner out for a sailing expedition to the Pacific. She will start within a month if the sale is made, and go round the Horn.

Sad Death.—This forenoon Mr. John Hughes, Ke. Street west, received the following telegram:
MOSCOW, Nov. 1.

To JOHN HUGHES:
"Peter McNaughton is dead. Burned last night. Taking remains to Charlottetown. Leaving tomorrow."

Another telegram was received by the President of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, notifying him of the death, but giving no particulars. Mr. McNaughton with his mother and brother left here a few years ago and settled in Moscow. They kept the Park Hotel there, and Peter had a large bottling establishment and cigar agency on Main Street. He was very popular with the people of Moscow, and was said to be worth several thousand dollars. He was about twenty-five years of age. Full particulars will be found in our telegraphic column.

The DeSable Seaweed Case.—Stipendiary Magistrate Palmer rendered his decision yesterday afternoon in the suit brought by Richard Nelson against George McFarlane, being an action for carrying away a load of seaweed from the foreshore in front of the plaintiff's land on the Street (Nigel's Island). The case was tried on the 24th October, when a large number of witnesses were examined on both sides. It was contended by the defendant's counsel, Mr. Stewart, Q. C., that in no event could the plaintiff succeed in the present action, as the Island statute under which it was instituted had been expressly repealed by the Dominion Parliament. Mr. Stewart contended on that ground the case must be dismissed, and that it was unnecessary to argue on the other points in controversy. Mr. Hazard, Q. C., on behalf of the plaintiff, argued that the Dominion Parliament had no power to repeal the local statute in question. The magistrate yesterday dismissed the case without costs on the ground that the law was repealed.

Another Butter Factory.—Machinery for making butter at the New Ferdy Factory was put in yesterday, and butter-making will be continued into the winter. Mr. Dillon leaves this afternoon to attend meetings in behalf of the new venture and for the purpose of aiding the dairy industry generally.

The Souris Match Race.—Telephonic advices from Souris report that "the race between Billy McKie and Onward was not finished last night. Each horse won two heats, and the fifth heat was declared a draw. Onward's judge, Mr. Bowness, refused to start today to see the race ended, and we are informed that Mr. McDonald, owner of Onward, accepted \$35 and left for home a wiser man." The time for the four heats allowed was, 2:33; 2:32; 2:30; 2:31. The judges were John McLean, W. B. Bowness and Oliver Mason.

Runaway.—A young beast belonging to Councillor Hughes, with a two-wheeled sledge attached, ran away about noon today. He started on Water street, ran along to Pownal, up Pownal to Grafton and along Grafton to Great George.
