

MCA Defeat Holman's 9-1 In Advance To Finals

The Maritime Central Airways baseball team today are set to meet the Curran and Briggs Juniors in the Island Baseball League finals after an easy 9-1 victory over Holman's Intermediates of Summerside in a sudden-death semi-final game at Memorial Field last night.

Waldo Munro, M.C.A.'s play-off lead ticket, tossed a brilliant three-hitter to knock Holman's out of contention. He allowed two infield singles plus a one base knock into right field during the nine-inning contest.

He was aided in his task by some timely hitting on the part of his team-mates plus four costly errors by the visiting ball players. Elmer MacNeill, M.C.A.'s right-fielder led the batters with two hits and three runs batted in.

The City players won the ball game in the first inning. MacNeill drove two men home with a single into left field and scored himself when Jackie Burke blasted a triple into deep right.

Joe Bernard started on the mound for Holman's and pitched good ball for the Summerside team. He worked for six innings and gave up four hits and five runs. Only two of the runs were earned.

Donnie Simmons took over from Bernard at the start of the seventh and gave up three hits and four runs, only one of which was earned. He struck out six batters and in the ninth inning did the unique trick of whiffing four batters.

M.C.A. went into a 4-0 lead in the second inning with Lorne Hennessey scoring on a passed ball after getting on base through an outfield error. They added another in the sixth as MacNeill scored after drawing a walk. Holman's went lax in the ninth inning and permitted four more M.C.A. runners to cross the plate.

Garth Gay got Summerside's first base hit off Munro. He hit a slow one down towards short. Paul Jay scooped the ball and

threw to first but Gay was ruled safe on a close play.

In the same inning Charlie Doucette hit a slow one down the third base line and beat it out for a hit. Munro got out of trouble by whiffing Michell and forcing Bernard to fly out to centre.

Joe Bernard got Holman's only solid hit off Munro as he led off the ninth with a smash down the first base line that might have gone for extra bases only for a quick play by MacNeill. He went to second on the catcher's error and later scored on an error by the shortstop.

The M.C.A. outfield played well with Burke and Lewis each making one hard catch. Irving MacKinnon at third robbed pinch hitter Underwood of a hit in the ninth while Charlie Doucette made a good running catch off Jackie Burke in the fourth inning.

The date of the M.C.A.-Curran and Briggs play-off for the Island League championship has not yet been decided.

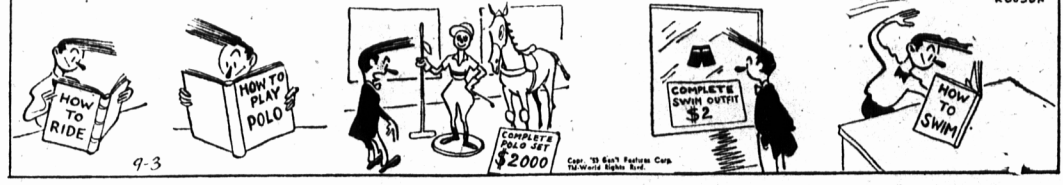

NEW YORK. (AP)—Variety, the entertainment industry trade paper, reported Wednesday that former president Harry Truman will make his first commercial television appearance Sept. 20 and will be paid about \$8,000.

The report said he will appear on "Excursion", a Ford Foundation program over NBC aimed at younger folk, to discuss opportunities in America and the point 4 program to aid underdeveloped nations.

Truman's 10-minute talk is to originate from his office in Kansas City.

Expect Deserter From Navy To Be Granted Amnesty

LONDON. (Reuters)—The Admiralty said Wednesday that "most likely" Ivor Hughes, 35, a Welsh miner who deserted from the Royal Navy in 1941, would be granted an amnesty.

Hughes gave himself up in Vancouver because "I wanted my own name back." Since he deserted as a Captain, he said, he had been going under the name of a childhood friend, Alan Medd.

Because he was a wartime deserter the death sentence could possibly be enforced but Admiralty officials said that if desertion was his only offence then the Royal amnesty declared by the Queen to mark her Coronation would seem "on the surface" to apply to him.

The admiralty added, however, that his record would have to be checked before action could be taken.

Probe Ordered In Ont. Mental Hospital Death

TORONTO. (CP)—An inquiry and an inquest have been ordered into the death of 20-year-old professional athlete Joe Dudzic.

Dudzic died within a week of being arrested and was buried in Whitby, 27 miles east of here. His parents claimed they heard nothing of their son's fate from the time he was remanded at a Toronto court for medical examination at the Ontario hospital, Whitby until they were shown his partly filled-in grave a week later.

The inquiry was launched Wednesday by the Ontario reform institutions department and an inquest has been tentatively fixed for Sept. 8.

Backing a demand for a full investigation into the youth's death is the United Packinghouse Workers Union (CIO-CCL) to which Dudzic's father, Sebastian Dudzic, belongs.

J. A. Graham, executive assistant in the department of reform institutions, said the usual criminal procedure in Dudzic's case were rushed "because of his violent condition and the fact he obviously needed immediate care."

Plan 4 Million NFB Building At Montreal

OTTAWA. (CP)—A Public Works Department official said Wednesday that tenders will be called in the next few weeks for construction of a new \$4,000,000 building for the National Film Board in Montreal.

There has been some criticism here of the move, which would involve approximately 530 NFB employees. Some of the employees prepared a brief setting out reasons why it would be better to erect the new film headquarters in Ottawa. At present the NFB is housed in various buildings around the capital.

To Challenge Billy Direct's Record For Mile

COLUMBUS, Ohio. (AP)—Billy Direct's 15-year-old record of 1:55 for the mile will be challenged next month at the Lexington, Ky., trots.

Earl Wagner of Landover Hills, Md., advised the United States Trotting Association Wednesday he will send his sensational pacer, Hi-Lo's Forbes, after the all-time mark in a time trial.

Billy Direct set his 1:55 record 15 years ago this month, Sept. 26 at Lexington, in a spring against the stop watches, but since then no horse, has trotted or paced a mile faster than 1:55 1/5.

Wagner told the Association he figured Hi-Lo's Forbes, world record holder over a half-mile track with a 1:58 3/5 clocking this year, has a fighting chance to lower Billy Direct's time.

"I figure Hi-Lo's Forbes can go the first quarter in 28 seconds and the next three in 29 apiece," Wagner said. "That would equal Henry Clukey can cut a fifth of a second off that time somewhere during the mile."
