British Papers Hint Defence Minister To Be Retired Soon

LONDON (CP) — Sir Walter Monckton, Britain's defence minister, is again the subject of retirement reports. Several British newspapers hint that a government shuffle is impending, with Sir Walter as the key figure. The News Chronicle, Liberal, says categorically that Monckton "is resigning." The Yorkshire Post, Conservative, says "it is believed" he wishes to resign. The consensus is that if the change does take place, Sir Walter will probably accept a peerage. He might remain in the government as paymaster-general, a post now vacant. Sir Walter, 65, was appointed labor minister in 1951 by former premier Sir Winston Churchill. There were reports he wanted to retire, mainly for health reasons, C.D.

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Germans Had Details Of Secret Message In Week

LONDON (Reuters) — German spies delivered into Hitler's hands details of a top-secret personal message from President Roosevelt to Winston Churchill within a week of its receipt in London.

The message, according to captured German foreign ministry documents published here today, concerned the handing over to Britain of 50 used American destroyers, the supplying of U.S. anti-aircraft guns and ammunition, and steel deliveries.

U.S. Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy delivered the message to Prime Minister Churchill May 15, 1940—19 months before the United States entered the Second World War.

One of the main points made by Roosevelt, according to the documents, was that the American fleet at that time was "concentrated at Hawaii where it must in any case remain for the moment."

The German foreign ministry published today reports on plans for sabotage in the United States, planting of agents within the government in Washington, refusal of the American press to be

"bought," and many other details of the Nazi campaign in America. Hans Thomsen, German chargé d'affaires in Washington, reported to Foreign Minister von Ribbentrop in April, 1940, that valuable information had been obtained from "a reliable and tried confidential agent who is very friendly with the director of the code room of the state department."

Thomsen said this agent saw documents disclosing that Ambassador Kennedy in London had reported "serious differences of opinion between London and Paris."

Roosevelt's letter to Churchill was described in an urgent message forwarded by German Ambassador von Mackensen in Rome to Berlin. Von Mackensen said that details of the letter had been revealed by "an unimpeachable source."

He noted Roosevelt's letter as saying 40 or 50 old-type destroyers could be handed over to Britain, subject to congressional approval and providing national defence did not require them.

PRESS UNCO-OPERATIVE In March, 1940, Thomsen, the Washington envoy, reported trouble with the American press in Georgetown.

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
