#### New Brunswick Politics.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 10.

The Blair Government Convention of King's County has renominated ex-Speaker White, and instead of Solicitor General Pugsley and Dr. Taylor, who are retiring, has selected Mr. Flewelling, an ex-legislative councillor, and Mr. Scovil. The latter, it is understood, has declined to run in York, where four candidates will run. The Orange Convention, following the temperance people, has nominated H. H. Pitts, who will run as an equal righter, prohibitionist and opposition candidate. The regular opposition has nominated only three candidates, so that the odd vote may be thrown to Pitts, if voters so desire. The opposing candidates are W. K. Allen, ex-Warden Howe and Councillor Pender. There is a revolt against the ticket placed in the field by Mr. Blair in St. John. Geo. Knodell, a printer and a liberal, has issued his card as an independent Government supporter.

#### More Record Smashing.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.

J. S. Marshall, of the New York Athletic Club, threw the 16 pound hammer 145 feet 3 inches, beating his own and the world's record of 141 feet 9 inches.

SPRINGFIELD, Oct. 10.

Wilde made a mile on a bicycle in 2:06.3-5 and 2:03.3-5, both standing starts. Both beat the world's records.

#### Terrible Storm.

BELLEVILLE, Oct. 10.

A terrible thunder and lightning storm passed over here last week. A family named Austin, living 7 miles from Frankford were struck by lightning and three of them were badly injured that they died in a few hours.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.

The Bohemia, the last of the cholera ships, was allowed to proceed to her dock in Harlem yesterday. The steamer passengers were landed at Ellis Island, from quarantine.

#### Tennyson's Funeral Sermon.

LONDON, Oct. 10.

The Bishop of Winchester preached Tennyson's funeral sermon in Hammersmith Church yesterday. He referred to the dead poet laureate in eulogistic and feeling terms.

#### Business Man Dead.

Vincent White, a leading wholesale provision dealer and one of the most substantial business men of the city, is dead.

FOR THE NORTHWEST.—Fifty settlers have left Montreal for St. Albert, N. W. T., in charge of Rev. Abbe Morin. They are all French Canadians and will settle in Mounville. This is the third party taken out this year by the same clergyman.

MEDAL.—On Saturday last C. J. Mitchell received the medal won by him in the half-mile bicycle race contested on the Driving Park during the recent Exhibition. The medal, which was presented by Mr. F. DeC. Davies, is of solid silver, and is pendant from a bar on which is engraved the winner's name. In the centre of the medal is a safety bicycle, around the wheel of which is a gold band, with the words "Half-mile Bicycle Race" thereon.

A SCHOONER RACE.—Joseph McGill, owner and builder of the cruiser Kingfisher, which recently visited Charlottetown, is out with a challenge to any schooner in Canada to race the Kingfisher, on any suitable day between the 20th and 25th of October, over a course, say from Point Pleasant buoy in Halifax harbor, around the automatic buoy at the entrance to Lunenburg harbor, and back to Point Pleasant buoy, sailing outside of Sambro, both going and returning, for from five hundred to one thousand dollars a side.
