Need Higher Rate Of Immigration

TORONTO, April 17 - (CP) - Steps should be taken to ensure a higher rate of immigration than has prevailed since the war, says a report on immigration forwarded to Prime Minister St. Laurent by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

The report was prepared by a C. M. A. special committee made up of 70 men in varied lines of business across Canada, and was approved by the Association's National Executive Council in Hamilton April 10.

The report said that "the government's target of 150,000 immigrants in 1951 should be a minimum and not a maximum figure."

Bradley Against Extension Of War

CHICAGO, April 17 - (AP) - Gen. Omar N. Bradley spoke out today against Gen. Douglas MacArthur's suggestions that the Korean war be extended to China. Bradley was the first of MacArthur's fellow five-star military men to raise his voice publicly against the proposals since MacArthur was ousted from his Far East post last week by President Truman.

Bradley, chairman of the joint Chiefs of staff, did not mention MacArthur's name. But he said: "There is little immediate danger of this country being over-run—but our way of life, our freedom and our nation have the best chances for survival by keeping peace in the world."

"This is the over-riding consideration of our national foreign and military policies. Any recommended course of action which would enlarge the present war is contrary to our best interests, and by jeopardizing world peace, ultimately would threaten our security."

Dandelion Rubber Too Costly

HALIFAX, April 17 - (CP) - Production of rubber from Russian dandelions proved successful in Nova Scotia but too costly to continue, officials of the Experimental Farm at Kentville said today.

They were commenting on reports that dandelion tires for bicycles were being manufactured in Sweden under a similar process.

Russian dandelion seeds were brought to Nova Scotia in 1942 and grown at the Kentville station.

"There was no trouble to grow them and the rubber content was high, but it proved too costly," officials said today.

The experiments were discontinued at the end of the Second World War.

Large Decrease In Butter Stocks

OTTAWA, April 17 - (CP) - Stocks of creamery butter in nine Canadian cities declined sharply on April 13, amounting to 4,886,000 pounds, compared with 19,212,000 on the corresponding date last year, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Holdings by cities with last year's totals in brackets: Quebec 220,000 (140,000); Montreal 1,576,000 (2,423,000); Toronto 1,248,000 (4,738,000); Winnipeg 496,000 (7,695,000); Regina 57,000 (816,000); Saskatoon 123,000 (173,000); Edmonton 584,000 (2,034,000); Calgary 209,000 (579,000); Vancouver 423,000 (819,000).

New Treatment For Chest Diseases

BOCHUM, Ruhr, April 17 - (Reuters) - The campaign against silicosis and other miners' chest diseases has taken a favorable turn as the result of experiments in the Ruhr.

A new treatment featuring calcium inhalation has been tried at the Hanover-Hannibal coal mines near Bochum.

Fritz Lange, the company's managing director and one of the leading mining technicians in the Ruhr, last year built an experimental clinic at pithead to develop the methods tried out at Wiesbaden for the treatment of bronchitis and kindred ailments.

CNR Mechanical Staff Meeting

MONTREAL, April 17 - Problems relating to the maintenance and production of Canadian National Railways rolling stock came under discussion here today at the opening of the company's annual system mechanical meeting. The meeting which will be in session today and Wednesday is under the chairmanship of E. R. Battley, chief of motive power and car equipment.

Officers representing the entire system are in attendance. In his opening address, Mr. Battley told the meeting the increased traffic has placed heavy demands on the department and the task of meeting these demands will be more difficult in the face of material shortages. He called upon supervisory personnel to continue their efforts in maintaining the department's high standard of efficiency.

General superintendents of motive power and car equipment attending the meeting include A. Beardslaw, Winnipeg; W. C. Sealley, Toronto; E. Wynne, Moncton; W. C. Bower, Battle Creek, Mich., and A. Selby, St. Albans, Vt. Montreal officers attending include E. P. Stenham, assistant chief of car equipment; A. C. Melanson, works manager, Point St. Charles Shops; and E. J. Feasey, general supervisor of diesel equipment.

Egg Production Still On Increase

The production of eggs in Prince Edward Island continues to increase, reports Mr. F. M. Nash, District Inspector, Poultry Products. Receipts show production nearing its peak. Quality of product is good and demand is strong. With few exceptions, the Atlantic Provinces are absorbing all supplies. Prices remain strong and operators of grading stations are quoting producers for ungraded eggs: Grade A Large 46, Grade A Medium 44, Grade A Pullet and B 38-40, Grade C 28. Dealers are quoting operators of grading stations for the graded pack delivered Grade A Large 53, Grade A Medium 51, Grade A Pullet and B 45, Grade C 30, and quoting the same pack to retailers at Grade A Large 56, Grade A Medium 54, Grade A Pullet and B 47. Eggs are retailing to consumers at Grade A Large 60-2, Grade A Medium 58-50, Grade A Pullet 50, Grade B 46-52.

Remember, whether it is in the winter, spring, or summer, eggs should be held at temperatures not higher than 55 degrees F.
