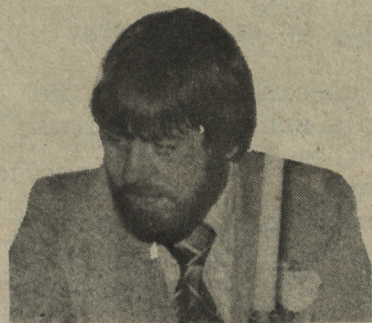

Dear Editor,

In response to "The Abortion Dilemma"

It is unfortunate that this article whose title seemed to purport some form of objectivity and concern for the problem of abortion, rather chose to be biased, misleading, and consequently narrow minded. It will never cease to amaze me how the author, even in his past articles, has prostrated himself before the American Eagle. His constant appeal to the divine image of "America the beautiful" as the source of justice, life, and the pursuit of happiness, is at best a naive projection of his own "apple pie syndrome". Thus, by virtue of the Supreme Court of the United States of America abortion, like apple pie, is a natural right.

I would first like to point out that Mr. Sanlei's statistics were misleading and biased; he says, "88% of the American people 'supported abortion in all or some circumstances.'" On Jan. 18 the National Abortion Rights League (NARAL) released a poll which said 69% of

American registered voters

"believe abortion should be legal under certain circumstances while 19% believe it should be always legal." (69 plus 19 = 88) Mr. Sanlei has conveniently combined the two figures to more easily mislead his readers.

Moreover, he implies that anyone who is Pro-life is only that way because of their religious conviction, that only some sort of blind faith can make one believe in Pro-life. He neglects to consider that there are those who do not need to postulate a God to justify their position.

I for one am not willing to prostrate myself before Mr. Sanlei's divine effigy (the American Eagle) nor, in some sort of religious fanaticism will I say abortion is always wrong; it would seem the issue is not black and white (as Mr. Sanlei would have us believe with his religious Americanism) but rather, grey. Abortion can not so easily be dismissed as amoral. There must be some form of equilibrium between abortion demand and illegal and kitchen table abortions.
