# Duke Snider Candidate For N.L. Batting Honors

NEW YORK (AP) — Duke Snider of the Brooklyn Dodgers is the newest candidate for National League batting honors.

The slugging outfielder wrestled the lead from team-mate Jackie Robinson this week and withstood the challenge of Stan Musial and Ray Jablonski, the St. Louis Cardinals' one-two batting punch.

Sixth a week ago, Snider boosted his average to .378. The Duke, who batted .336 in 1953, collected 17 hits in 36 at bats.

Musial remains in the runner-up position with .370 and Jablonski still is third at .369. Robinson meanwhile, lost 33 points and tumbled from the top to sixth at .355. Figures include Sunday's games.

The top two places in the American League hitting list remain the same. Lender Bobby Avila of the Cleveland Indians and steammate Al Rosen, in second, are sidelined with injuries. Avila, the Mexican second baseman, holds a .381 clip and Rosen boasts a .364 mark. Neither saw action last week.

Detroit's Frank House advanced from ninth to third with .331.

Musial has taken over undisputed possession of the National League home run lead with 21 and also is the pace-setter in runs batted in with 69.

The Tribe climaxed its assault—a season's high for hits—with a six-run fifth inning in which George Strickland and Al Smith hit back-to-back home runs.

Strickland's drive accounted for the year and second of the series. Smith followed with a solo homer, his third of the season.

After loser Bill Henry, troubled with wildness, walked Wally Westlake and Jim Hegan, Lemon aided his own cause with a double into the right field corner to drive in the first run of the big fifth.

Strickland and Smith then hom-

ered and it was 8-0. Larry Doby bunted a single down the third base line and Vic Wertz scored aim with a two-base blow into the right field corner that bounced away from Jim Piersall.

The defeat stretched Boston's losing streak to seven games.

Lemon got credit for his eighth victory of the season against three losses but had help from Narleski during the last two innings.

"It was the same way the night I fought Joe Louis. A lot of people told me he was over the hill but I didn't listen to them. To me, he was the Louis I had been reading about for years."

The champ was Berry Brown from the summer sun and completely relaxed. If this was a "stale" fighter, you'd never know it.

"I feel just the same as I always do before a fight," he said. "Maybe I wouldn't know if I was overtrained. I just get in shape and then go in there and fight."

Looking ahead past the Charles fight, Marciano said he hoped to fight in September.

"I've got plans for a big family, and that takes a lot of money these days," he said. "Up to fight now, I couldn't say that I'm coming for the future. Not that I'm complaining. I've been doing very good. But not enough to feel secure."

At the age of 29 the champ has no thought of hanging up the gloves. After Charles it may be Don Cockell of London or possibly Hurricane Tommy Jackson. In case Charles upsets Rocky, the rematch will be held in September.
