Third Victim Recovered By Divers

SUMMERSIDE — The body of Moses Sark, 35, the third drowning victim in a Christmas Eve tragedy in the mile stretch of water between Port Hill and the Indian reservation of Lennox Island, was recovered at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon by divers assisting RCMP in the operation.

Sark was one of four occupants in a car which plunged through the ice midway across the span of water as it was crossing to the island on the afternoon of Dec. 24.

The bodies of the other two men, Fred Thomas, Charlottetown, and Michael Companion, West Devon, were recovered Christmas Day.

The fourth occupant in the vehicle, the owner George Bell of Mt. Pleasant, managed to scramble out of the car through an open window before it plunged into the 20-foot depth of water. Although he could not swim Bell managed to secure a hold on the ice edge and crawl to a safety. After manoeuvring himself back on the ice he made his way to Newcombe's store in Port Hill from where he called the RCMP of the tragedy. He later was taken to hospital suffering from shock and exposure where he remained for two days.

Recovery operations for the third victim were called off Christmas when divers ran out at compressed air.

The RCMP, assisted by residents of Lennox Island and Port Hill and divers, went out again Saturday but due to high winds, choppy water and moving ice were unable to resume their task.

Upon return to the tragedy area yesterday they found that all ice had gone out with the tide and with the assistance of three boats from Lennox Island and one from Port Hill under the supervision of Sgt. W. L. Bellow, RCMP in charge of the Summerside RCMP detachment, were successful in bringing the body to the surface.

The divers involved in yesterday's operation were LAC Bert Skinner of RCMP Summerside and Elmer Crosman of Summerside.

(Continued from page 1) perhaps best known for the time he tossed a coin for \$1,000,000.

Argus had set out to purchase a new business and everything was settled except the price. After hours of haggling, \$1,000,000 separated seller and buyer. Mr. Phillips suggested tossing a coin for the difference. He won the toss.

Born in Toronto, Mr. Phillips graduated in chemical engineering in 1914 from the University of Toronto.

The same year he went to Germany to study. He left Germany before the outbreak of the First World War and enlisted with the Leinster regiment in England as a private.

By his 23rd birthday he had risen to the rank of lieutenant. He was wounded by a machine-gun bullet in 1918. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Order and the Military Cross and was twice mentioned in dispatches.

He was made a Commander of the Order of the British Empire for his work with Research and Development in Canada during the Second World War. The corporation was created to produce a wide variety of electrical instruments and equipment which were generally developed in the "development of radar".

WAS UO CHAIRMAN

One of Mr. Phillips' main interests outside his work was the University of Toronto. He was appointed chairman of the university's board of governors in 1948. He retired as chairman last October but remained on the board and was named honorary chairman.

University President Claude T. Bissonet in a statement said that Mr. Phillips "summed up, it seemed to me, the contribution of a man of his calibre to the running of a university."

"Although he was a graduate in chemical engineering... he had wide interests in art, literature and history and was receptive to the strengthening of arts as a part of the university program. He fostered sound learning and scholarship."

He leaves his wife, Doris, three sons and two daughters. Funeral service will be held Tuesday in St. John's Anglican Church in suburban York Mills, with interment in the church cemetery.

HALFAX (CP) — The weather office says colder air pushed into the Maritimes Sunday but not before new record maximum temperatures for Dec. 27 were set in all three provinces. Most of these occurred in the early morning hours. Greenwood at 61 was the mildest but by late evening the temperature there had dropped to 37.

Rain was still occurring in most of Nova Scotia but the precipitation in Prince Edward Island and Southern New Brunswick had changed to freezing rain and snow.

The precipitation will change to snow in all three provinces today. A disturbance in Virginia is expected to pass south of the Maritimes late today and continue the snow.

Seven Are Hospitalized After Four Accidents

A total of seven people were admitted to Prince County Hospital between Christmas Eve and Saturday night suffering various injuries received in motor vehicle accidents over the two-day span.

The most serious accident occurred at approximately 9 p.m. Saturday night which resulted in five being rushed to hospital by ambulance.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Granville Street and the Sherbrooke Road near town. A 1955 model car owned and driven by Wilfred Peters, 16, of Summerside, while proceeding along Granville Street, failed to make the turn onto the Sherbrooke Road and careened out of control into a deep ditch.

Also injured along with the driver were: Roger Steele, 15, Bernie Gillis, 15, Clem Peters, 15, and Claude Simpson Lecky, 14, all of Summerside.

The attending physician, Dr. W.E. Callaghan, said last night that all were suffering from concussion along with other injuries including, broken jaw, broken nose, crushed chest, injured neck and other injuries. He said, however, that none were in serious condition.

The vehicle itself was extensively damaged.

A Summerside airman, LAC Joseph Gendza, was admitted to hospital shortly after 11:30 p.m. Christmas Eve suffering from scalp lacerations and facial cuts following an accident on Duke Street in which the 1957 sports model he was driving struck a parked car.

The other vehicle involved in

the collision was a 1963 station wagon owned by Gerard Henry Bernard of Summerside. Total damage was estimated to be \$800.

Dr. J.K. Beer attended the injured man.

Damage to the Daley vehicle was said to be in the vicinity of \$500.
