Appointment Of New Lt. Governor Pending

Buzzing rumors of the impending appointment of a new lieutenant-governor to take over from Hon. F. Walter Hyndman are keeping political and social circles in a mild uproar.

Apparently the field has narrowed to two choices, with only faint rumblings being heard of possible alternates.

He said, "I am never bothered by a hostile audience, but the audience tonight is not hostile, and my heart is full. William Burns, president of the East Prince Liberal Association, was chairman for the evening and a rousing sing-song was led by J. P. McInnis.

Vocal solos were provided by Miss Isabel Darby, accompanied by Lowell Huestis. Catering for the banquet was by the Ladies Auxiliary of the Summerside branch of the Legion.

Most commonly mentioned for the post are Alex McIsaac, local businessman and former minister of labor in the last Liberal administration; and B. Earle MacDonald, OBE, former Mayor of Charlottetown and provincial treasurer in the last Matheson government.

Still mentioned as a possible nominee is E. P. Foley, druggist of Summerside, and former member of the legislature.

On the basis of what is known, or surmised, at present it is thought the appointment will be made on behalf of those present and Mr. MacDonald told the writer they would accept the post.

DEEMS IT HONOR
Mr. McIsaac said at the time: "The position of lieutenant-governor is one of great honor and responsibility at all times, and undoubtedly will entail even a greater responsibility and duties during the forthcoming centennial term. I certainly deem it an honor to have my name considered."

Another factor involved, although not necessarily ineluctable procedure, is the rule of the past that, whenever possible, the post alternated between Protestant and Roman Catholic nominees.

Both Mr. McIsaac and Mr. Foley are Protestants.

Over the past years, one somewhat unusual factor has entered into considerations of acceptance of the position and that is peculiarly less generally suffered by incumbents at Government House.

EXPENSES HEAVY
Expenses of holding the post have been heavy, due primarily to the many demands made on the lieutenant-governor to provide entertainment for distinguished visitors. The latter, in recent years, have included Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and His Highness Prince Philip. Many other members of royalty have also been guests in the historic, old residence.

In addition to house guests, there is the even more pressing matter of constant pressure to receive special guests, such as visiting dignitaries, entertaining at formal receptions and balls, and almost maintain 'open house' for heads of delegations or various convention groups.

At the present time, this assumes greater importance in the view of the undoubtedly heavy demands which will be made on the office holder in 1964, and again in 1967, and it is thought possible the provincial government may make a special allowance to assist in handling the extra expense involved during the province's celebration of the centennial of the 1864 meeting here which led to Confederation.

ANNUAL SALARY
At present, the federal government pays the incumbent an annual retainer of \$8,000 and is believed to assist in the entertainment expenses to the extent of approximately \$6,000. The provincial government takes care of maintenance costs of Government House, and this year has the amount of \$8,000 in the estimate to provide for this matter.

The old Colonial official residence, built about 1842, needs constant attention to prevent deterioration, and the heating cost, alone, is a big item for

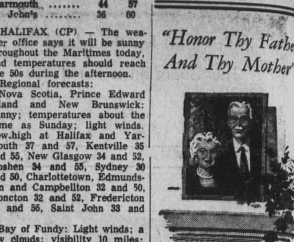
