

will not stand upon any of the field; that a good soil inclining to sand, gravel, or loam, is to be preferred, avoiding clay, and even a clayey sub-soil, if possible, as they do not permit the water to pass off so soon as required. The ground, he says, should be ploughed and planted as early in the spring as practicable; and the potatoes dug as soon as they are ripe; after which they should be put in a dry and airy place, and kept until cold weather makes it necessary to remove them to the cellar, where they should be kept as cool as possible without danger of freezing.

In the selection of seed, he makes choice of the hardest varieties, and for the last two years, he has applied lime, plaster, and wood ashes, in the hill, at the time of planting with good result.
