Sea Crabs Three Feet Across.

[Scientific Journal.]

Professor Verrill, of the United States fish commission, reports that the zoological results of the deep sea explorations last year, were of great interest. Many additions to the fauna of great depths were made, and a large proportion of them are undescribed forms. Some of the fishes were of great interest. Huge spiny spider-crabs over three feet across were taken in 1,000 to 1,230 fathoms, and another very large crab occurred in great abundance in 500 to 1,000 fathoms, while in 2,574 fathoms a large and strong crab-like creature was taken. Many curious shrimp, some of them of large size and brightly colored, and often with perfect eyes, occurred in most of the deepest dredgings. Several interesting new forms of corals, gorgonians, sea-pens, and allied forms also occurred.

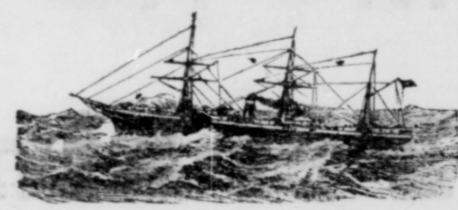
