## Pair Sentenced For Break At Legion Home In S'ide

Lawrence (Larry) Gallant, 30, of Summerside was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary and John (J. B.) Petty, 24, also of Summerside was given a 15-month term in the Prince County Jail after they both pleaded guilty to breaking, entering and theft in Summerside Police Court yesterday morning.

Gallant and Petty received similar sentences of 15 months in Prince County Jail by Magistrate E. H. Strong Q.C. However Gallant implied that he would prefer a sentence in Dorchester Penitentiary rather than in the local jail and Magistrate Strong obliged with the two-year term.

## Problem Involved In Surplus Butter Market

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada still is looking for more butter markets but preferably in countries not supplied by New Zealand. Indications are the government will try to ship more to Communist East Germany.

The preference to look elsewhere developed from New Zealand representations following the recent federal sale of about 1,000,000 pounds of its surplus butter to Communist Czechoslovakia at 39 cents a pound.

New Zealand claimed that Canada perhaps unwittingly sold to the Czechs at a price below that paid by them to New Zealand.

Agriculture Minister Gardiner said in an interview Friday that he will investigate how New Zealand butter got into Czechoslovakia. Meanwhile, Canada will ship no more butter to the Czechs at a price below that paid by them to New Zealand.

The sales are from government-held surplus butter accumulated under the federal 58-cents-a-pound support price.

From other sources it was understood that the government is negotiating to ship perhaps 3,000,000 or 4,000,000 pounds to Communist East Germany. All this would come out of a government farder holding about 85,000,000 pounds.
