Launched in Summerside Harbor, a 20-foot cabin cruiser is seen returning to "the slip" at Holman's Wharf on Thursday afternoon.

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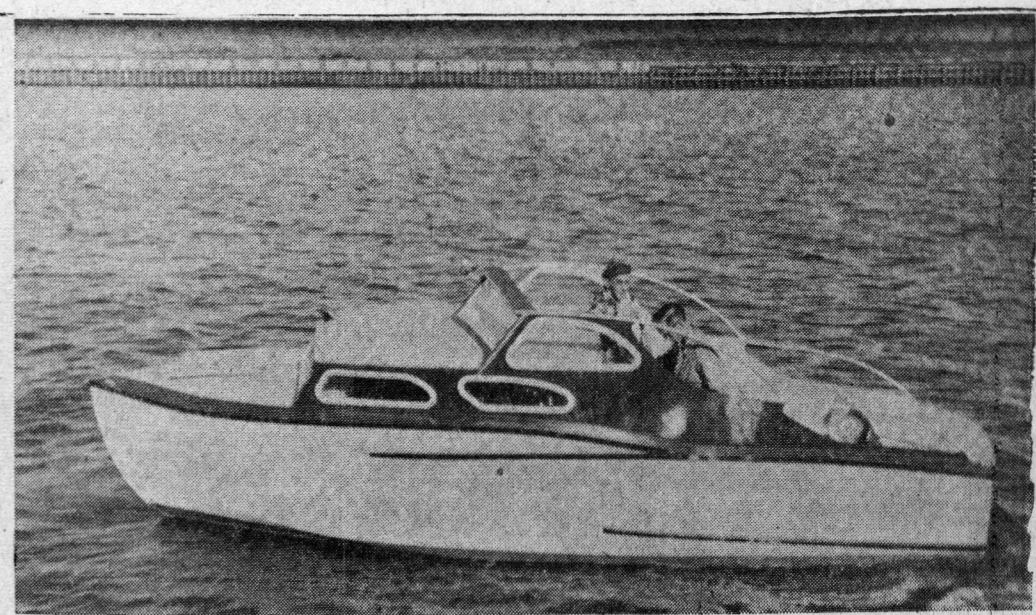
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PIUSVILLE

Contracts Awarded For Projects In Prince Co.

OTTAWA, (Special)—A contract for \$73,240 for construction of an extension to the breakwater of Fishing Cove, in Prince County, has been awarded to Morrison

and McRae Limited, Summerside, public works minister Howard Green announced Friday.

A second contract for a dredging project in Miminogash Harbor, also in Prince County, has gone to Norman M. McLean, of Murray River, P.E.I. It is for \$28,800.

The proposed extension to the Fishing Cove breakwater will be 300 feet long and consist of rubble (unclassified rock). It will extend the present 154-foot breakwater of pile bent construction to the southwest to cut off the

full flow of waves in the harbor. The extension will protect fishing boats which are at present exposed to southwesterly winds. About 800 live in the vicinity of fishing cove and use the harbor for fishing or farming purposes.

The work at Miminogash will consist of dredging near the breakwater there to provide additional shelter for fishing boats near the inner portion. Silt and other sand formation have worked in alongside the breakwater in a number of places.
