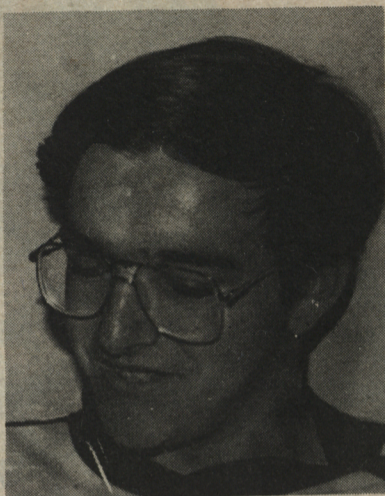

We asked the freshmen what they thought of orientation week.

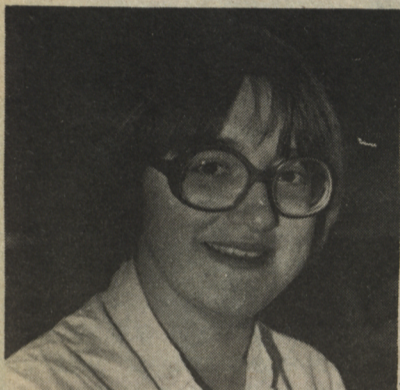


Fred O'Brien of Alberton
I wasn't that involved in orientation, but I heard about parts of it. It sounded all right.

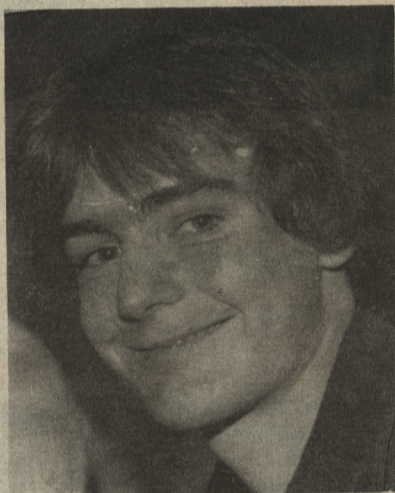
Chris Stuart of Charlottetown

LOCALS DO WELL NO, NOT THE PANTHERS

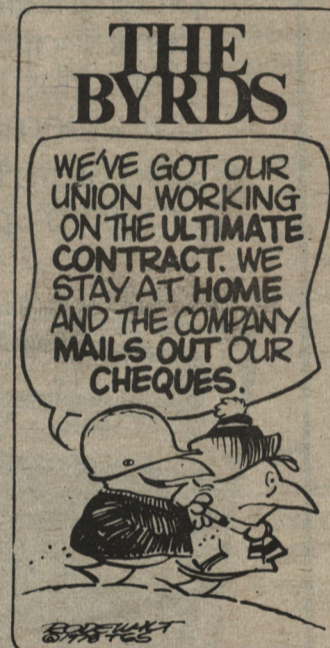
