"We are getting a more favorable reaction during this campaign than in any other previous year," said James Wright, president of the Charlottetown chapter of the Canadian Cancer Society.

"The drive has only been underway since Monday but the reaction of the people has been most encouraging and enlightening, especially since our organization is at a disadvantage with respect to similar groups," he said.
