

Khrushchev Blasts At U.S. In Tass Interview

MOSCOW (AP) — Premier Khrushchev said Sunday the Soviet Union will come to the aid of Red China only in the event of an American attack.

He accused President Eisenhower of wilfully distorting the Soviet Union's position on the Far East crisis. In a sharply worded interview with Tass, the Soviet news agency, he said the president "quite wrongly interpreted well-known statements of the Soviet government on events in the Taiwan area" at his Oct. 1 press conference.

The Soviet premier said the president tried to convey the impression, by "tricks," that the Soviet Union would interfere in civil war between the Chinese Communists and Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalists.

"The Soviet government has openly and unambiguously stated . . . in a message to President Eisenhower, that if the U.S.A. starts a war against our friend and ally — the Chinese People's Republic — the U.S.S.R. will fully honor her commitments, stipulated in the treaty of friendship, alliance and mutual aid with the C.P.R., and that an attack on the C.P.R. is an attack on the U.S.S.R.," Khrushchev asserted.

SUMMERSIDE: Sad news has been received here of the passing in Vancouver of Miss Edith MacNeill Montgomery on Sept. 29th. Miss Montgomery was born in Malpeque on August 3rd 1888 and attended school there before entering Prince of Wales College and Dalhousie University where she graduated with a B.A. degree.

Her entire life was spent in Vancouver where she taught mathematics at a high school until she retired in 1950.

She was in excellent health until July when she suffered a stroke. Another stroke a few weeks ago caused her death. She is survived by two brothers and two sisters, Charlotte, wife of the late Percy MacGougan Malpeque, Annie, wife of the late James Thompson, who resides in Moncton, James in Kensington and John in Delburne, Alberta. Also surviving are a number of first cousins, nieces and nephews who will long cherish the memory of a loving aunt.

Miss Montgomery visited in Malpeque each summer with her sister, and has many friends there. The sincere sympathy of the community and surrounding districts is extended to Mrs. MacGougan.

Girl Champion Quitting Skiing

ST. JOVITE, Que. (CP)—Lucile Wheeler, only Canadian ever to win a world ski championship, Sunday announced her retirement from competition skiing.

The pretty 23-year-old blond from St. Jovite, 60 miles north of Montreal, said she was quitting because the pressure of keeping up a champion's reputation would cut into her personal life too much. She said she wants to go into journalism.

Miss Wheeler last winter won the women's downhill and giant slalom titles at the world championships in Bad Gastein, Austria—the first time a skier from North America had ever won more than one title.

"I feel that I have reached the goal I set for myself several years ago," Miss Wheeler said in her retirement statement. "Any further effort to maintain my position would involve additional sacrifices toward my family and friends."

NEW YORK (AP)—Bob Turley and New York Yankees Sunday night were made 13-to-10 favorites to beat Lew Burdette and the leading Milwaukee Braves today in the fifth game of the best-of-seven series.

The Braves, ahead 3-1, need only one more victory to clinch their second straight series over the Yankees.

Although they made the home Yankees the favorites for today, bookmakers declined to quote any new odds on the full series.

Before Sunday's game, the Braves were 7-5 choices to win the set.

The odds on the fifth game seem out of line considering what Burdette has done to the Yankees and what the Braves have done to Turley. Burdette won three games from the Yankees in 1957 and beat Turley in the second game of this year's series.
