way for the customary debate on the Speech from the Throne. George Drew, Progressive Conservative leader, will start the debate Monday. He will be followed by Prime Minister St. Laurent, M.J. Colwell, C.C.F. leader, and Solon Low, Social Credit leader.

In opening proceedings, Agriculture Minister Gardiner said the government does not intend to let cattle producers bear the "whole brunt" of the consequences of the outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease in Saskatchewan. The government is "actively" investigating alternative outlets for Canadian livestock and animal products now banned from the United States market.

Trade Minister Howe said the United States had broken trade agreements by imposing restrictions on certain food imports from Canada but added that Canada is not planning any retaliatory action.

Health Minister Martin said that after "serious consideration" the government has decided not to establish a committee on health insurance at this session. Health and sickness surveys undertaken by the province have not yet been completed.

In his speech, Mr. George proposed steps leading to a combined development to harness the Bay of Fundy tides, for electricity and link Fundy with the Gulf of St. Lawrence for navigation.

The tidal project would utilize the tides of St. Mary's Bay, at the inland end of the Bay of Fundy, and it has been estimated more than 1,000,000 horsepower could be produced.

The resultant industrialization would "make a canal through the Isthmus of Chignecto a necessity, but it would have to be built from Moncton, N.B., to Shediac, N.B."

"The development of this project which could well be called the Maritime extension of the St. Lawrence Waterway development, would provide the industries which are sorely needed, as well as opening up the Bay of Fundy and New England ports to lake shipping."

Both Mr. George and Mr. Gaultier paid tribute to the late King and pledged loyalty to Queen Elizabeth.

makes and the efforts she puts forth to win men to God in every land. But there must be, according to Christ, a love of Christians for one another of the same character as His love for us all and the direct effect in us of that love. A great deal has been said and is being said about the failure of Christians to love one another as they ought, and much of it is deserved. And yet, who has not found in our church fellowship a heart-satisfaction and an inspiration that we find nowhere else? It ought to be warmer than it is but even as it is, it is a well-spring of gladness, and a source of power.

Two questions, First, how is it to be maintained? Christ answers, by keeping His commandments. These verses are read in our marriage service, and we know that the love of the wedded pair depends on keeping the pledges given each other in that hour. God holds the pledges which each gives the other, and any failure to keep them cuts us off from the source of all true love in Him. So in the sacred communion of God's people in the Divine Society — it is by diligent fulfilment of the obligations of love that we are held together in the love of Christ.

Second: What are the effects of that love? Again, Jesus answers: "By this shall all men know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

Look at our ideal! When we love one another as Christ loves us, we draw the world to Him.
