

List Suitable Small Trees And Shrubs For The Island

OTTAWA — The choice of small trees for landscaping the small home grounds in P.E.I. is largely restricted to such kinds as the Tree Lilac, Flowering Crab, Amur Maple and the European Mountain Ash. Mr. G.C. Warren, Senior Horticulturist, Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, P.E.I., says the Norway Maple is also widely planted, but it eventually becomes too large for most situations.

The European Mountain Ash is, in many respects, the most desirable small shade tree. The tree is hardy, graceful in form and attractive in bloom and fruit. The Amur Maple also makes an effective small tree and has very attractive foliage, especially in the fall when it turns to bright yellow.

THE OTHER TREES mentioned are usually considered as tall shrubs, and all are ornamental either in flower or fruit. They reach to a considerable height but are easily shaped to tree form.

Among the evergreens, the most popular is the Blue Spruce, but while this tree is hardy and attractive it soon grows out of bounds. At the present time there is no small evergreen tree entirely satisfactory for P.E.I.

A considerably wider choice exists in hardy shrubs and the following may be planted in almost all situations: Japanese Barberry, Mockorange, Siberian Pea Tree, P.G. Hydrangea, Hills of Snow Hydrangea, Honeysuckle, Spiraea, Snowball and Lilac. Among the low growing evergreens the Japanese Yew is the most hardy and attractive.

There are numerous other small trees and shrubs, of course, which may be planted in Prince Edward Island, but the above list may be considered basic for hardiness and general desirability.

SPIRITUAL PROBLEM

Even today some there are who find it difficult to accept all the implications of Cana, where Our Lord, we are told, not only attended a wedding feast but worked a miracle that there might be more to drink in honor of the occasion! It is, for these people, a real spiritual problem that He should have had anything to do with wine. Some actually attempt to intensify the spiritual quality of the Lord's Supper itself by substituting grape juice for wine. One is tempted to wonder how these would have escaped embarrassment if they had been present in the Upper Room that first Holy Thursday night. In a very real way our readiness or refusal to accept the naturalness and propriety of Christ's actions can be the test of whether we are disciples of the true Christ or merely disciples of our own conceptions of what proper conduct in God's own Son ought to be.

Incidents like that of Cana should strengthen our belief in the humanity of the Divine Son of God. If our awareness of that humanity brings God closer to us, that is as it should be. If, on the other hand, it makes us feel vaguely uncomfortable and we try to reconstruct Him according to our own lights, we may end up by exiling Him from our lives.

Why do so many modern Christians find it hard to reconcile themselves to the place of the Mother of Christ in traditional Christianity? It will be that they experience this difficulty because they fail to accept without reservations the idea that Christ was really a man "born of a woman, like unto us in all things save sin."

THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

HUMANITY OF CHRIST VERY REAL

Difficulties in our relationship with Christ may be said to be of two kinds: either we fail to measure up to His conceptions of what He ought to be, or He fails to measure up to our conceptions of what He ought to be. The second of these difficulties is by no means an uncommon one.

You will remember that Christ told the messengers who had been sent by John the Baptist: "Blessed is he who is not scandalized in Me" (Matt. 11, 16). Some years later St. Paul admitted frankly that his preaching of a crucified Christ was to the Jews indeed a stumbling block.

and to the Gentiles, foolishness." (1 Cor. 1, 23). Nevertheless it has been the constant teaching of the Christian Church that God took to Himself a human nature that, in the language of a human, He might give expression to the divine; that He might establish for Himself a place in man's world; that He might "pitch His tent" among them.

HUMAN YET DIVINE

From the very beginning, however, there have been people who found the human in Christ to be an obstacle in accepting the divine. In the trial before the Sanhedrin the high priest challenged him: "I adjure Thee by the living God that Thou tell us whether Thou art the Christ the Son of God."

When the Saviour testified that He was, the high priest tore his garments, saying, "He has blasphemed; what further need have we of witnesses? Behold now you have heard the blasphemy. What think you?" And they answered and said, "He is deserving of death." (Matt. 26, 62-67). These people, you see, would concede His divinity only by denying His humanity.

We see St. John struggling with this mentality in his emphatic proclamation that the Word Who was in the beginning, Who was with God, and Who was God, was the same God, "Who was made flesh and dwelt amongst us." (John 1, 14). Again, in the very same chapter, he makes use of the common standards of evi-
